TWO YEARS OF "WAR" AT M. U.

Regular Army Officers in Charge of University Military Training.

Columbia, Mo., July 12.—As a part of its bit, the University of Missouri will turn out men better prepared to take up arms for their country. Beginning with the regular 1917-18 session, which opens September 17, two years of military training will be required of all able-bodied men students. For the last several years one year of "war" has been required. The change in requirement will not affect those who entered the University in September, 1916, or earlier.

"War" at the University consists of drill three times a week, target practice, illustrated lectures, sham battles and the like. Regular army officers are in charge of the work, and the University corps is organized with student-officers who have shown special ability.

President A. Ross Hill has received a few protests from parents of prospective students against turning the University into a "war college." President Hill replies that a young man had better be prepared when the call comes than to be drafted entirely unprepared. The man who has had training such as the University gives, says Doctor Hill, is in line for a commission which will enable him to give greater service to his country and to place himself in a less dangerous position.

M. U. Big Teacher Factory.

Columbia, Mo., July 12.—The University of Missouri is an extensive school teacher factory. This year 416 degrees and certificates were awarded in the School of Education. In number of degrees, the "Teachers' College" leads all the nine schools and colleges of the University with 185. In addition, 160 life certificates to teach were awarded and 71 two-year certificates.

Ambassador Heads M. U. Curators.

Columbia, Mo., July 12.—David R. Francis, former governor of Missouri, now ambassador to Russia, was recently re-elected president of the Board of Curators of the University of Missouri. Mr. Francis, who holds an honorary degree from the University, has served eighteen years on the school's governing board.

DRAFT THE NATIONAL GUARD

President Issues Proclamation Discharging State Soldiers From Militia Status—Mobilize August 5.

Washington, July 10.—The last step necessary to make the entire national guard available for duty in France was taken today by President Wilson with the issue of a proclamation drafting the state troops into the army of the United States August 5.

To make certain that the purpose of the National Defense Act is carried out, the proclamation also specifically declares the men drafted to be discharged from the old militia status on that date. In that way the constitutional restraint upon use of militia outside the country is avoided and the way paved for sending the regiments to the European front.

Prior to the application of the draft, regiments in the northern and eastern sections of the country are called into the federal service as national guardsmen, in two increments to be mobilized July 15 and 25. Many units already are federalized and presumably they will be mobilized with the other troops from their states. The guard from the other states will be mobilized on the day of the draft. The arrangement was necessary to provide for movement of the regiments south to their concentration camps without congestion, and to the same end the division of states into these increments was revised from the original schedule.

The operative date of the draft was delayed until August 5 so that all regiments can be taken into the army simultaneously.

Fourteen camp sites for the sixteen tactical divisions into which the guard will be organized for war purposes have already been selected and the militia bureau is preparing the railway routing of the troops to the camps. Seven of the sites selected are in the Southeastern Department, five in the Southern and two in the Western. The only two divisions positively assigned are the Nineteenth, including the California guard, which will go to Linda Vista, Cal., and the Twentieth, including Oregon, Washington and other states in the Northwest, which will go to Palo Alto, Cal.

The Missouri and Kansas national guard, formerly drafted into the federal service August 5, will be trained in a camp at Deming, N. M., instead of Fort Sill, as originally planned. They will report to their armories August 5, but the camp will be ready a few days later and they soon will enter for their New Mexico camp.

It seems assured now that the Missouri-Kansas division will spend Christmas day behind the trenches in France for it is planned to rush the southern training and give them intensive work in France, just like Pershing's regulars.

GERMANY FOR ANNEXATION

Chancellor Hollwegg Tells Main Committee of Reichstag That Teutons Can Win the War Yet.

Berne, July 11.—Peace without annexations is not acceptable to Germany. Germany can win if she holds out.

Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollwegg so declared in a speech before the main committee of the Reichstag, according to quotations today in the Berlin Lokal Anzeiger.

"I consider it my duty to remain as chancellor for the protection of the fatherland," the chancellor said.

"Peace without annexations is not acceptable to Germany. I cannot declare our terms."

The chancellor's appearance before the main committee was called forth by demands of the Clericals that he outline in more detail exactly how the German government stood on the Socialists' platform of "no annexation and no indemnities."

The Lokal Anzeiger did not say how the imperial chancellor's speech was received.

GIVES CAUSE OF INACTION

Washington, July 11.—Fear of embarrassing the Justice Department's prosecution of certain paper manufacturers was the federal trade commission's answer today to the Senate resolution of June 28, asking why the commission had not moved to compel the manufacturers "to desist from illegal and unfair practices."

In its reply to the Reed resolution the commissions reviewed the entire history of its news print paper investigation, in the midst of which criminal indictments were handed down in New York against several manufacturers.

The commission renewed its recommendation to the Senate in a previous report that government control of the print paper distributing system and a co-operative arrangement with Canada "would speedily and effectively remedy the whole situation and bring practical and immediate relief."

Hit Two German Seaplanes. London, July 11.—Two German seaplanes were destroyed by the British armed trawler Iceland off Lowestoft, an admiralty announcement asserted today. Four of the German fliers were taken prisoner.

No Call for Second Loan.

Washington, July 11.—Published reports setting September 15 as the date of the next Liberty Loan and the amount at 3 billion dollars drew a formal denial today from Secretary McAdoo.

MISSOURI PAPERS WILL COMPETE FOR LOVING CUP

Award To Be Made at University for Good Citizenship Work.

Columbia, Mo., July 12.—Rules governing the award of the silver loving cup offered by the School of Journalism of the University of Missouri to the Missouri paper doing the most constructive work on behalf of good citizenship have been announced. The rules were formulated by a committee consisting of the president and two former presidents of the Missouri Press Association: H. J. Blanton of the Paris Appeal; William Southern, Jr., of the Independence Examiner; and Fred Naeter of the Cape Girardeau Republican. The contest is open to all Missouri newspapers.

The cup will be awarded to the Missouri newspaper which in the twelve months ending April 1, 1918, does, in its field, the most constructive work on behalf of good citizenship, which is interpreted to mean promoting, by publication of editorial, news, advertising and other articles, the elevation of the standards of living and the permission to all men of attainment of these standards.

Nominations for the award may be made by commercial clubs, civic leagues or other organized groups, or by individuals. They must be made prior to April 5, 1918, in writing to the School of Journalism and be accompanied by a written statement of the reasons for the nomination, together with a file of the issues of the newspaper containing the articles for which special claim is made.

The judges will be the president of the Missouri Press Association, the president of the Missouri Writers' Guild, and the president of the State Historical Society. The decision will be announced during Journalism Week, 1918, at the University.

A DOLLAR IN ROAD REPAIRS SAVES NINE

A New Kind of Battle.

Aside from the fact that it was the first American battle of the war, the engagement between Admiral Gleave's high seas convoy and the U-boats will have another title to a secure place in history. It was the first battle the world has ever seen between a fleet of submarines and another fleet. The U-boats have been used as auxiliaries in battle, though not often; but in this case, for the first time, they went forth as a squadron to attack an enemy in open fight. If years spent in slaughtering the defenseless, in blowing up merchant vessels and hospital ships, and shelling lifeboats has not demoralized the officers who command these vessels, they must sometimes have yearned for a respite from their horrible trade; must have longed to go out and fight other men man-fashion. Since they have never had the opportunity, no doubt they have indulged in dreams of what they could accomplish, have longed to show what they could do, have been full of confidence and flush of predictions. They had never fought, so their dreams could not be disproved, and doubtless they believed in them themselves.

Then how exultant must they have been when the word came to them to stop for a time their massacres, to return to port, and there make ready to set forth on a real adventure, an attack on an enemy squadron! It was not, even then, a fair match, for they could strike in the dark against large targets which would have difficulty in getting their range; but at least it would be a fight. Then came the attack, and the awakening from the dream. They fought their first, perhaps their last, battle; they hit nothing, they found themselves the target of a quick and accurate fire, their own grew scattered and feeble, and at last they turned tail and fled. The U-boat Captain made one attempt, in this war, to lift himself above the level to which his Admiralty had forced him down, and he failed.—New York Times.
