**U. S. FOOD ADMINISTRATION**

**Columbia, Mo. Missouri Div. February 26, 1918.**

**Subject: Sugar Profits.**

To All County Food Administrators:

1. Wholesalers' or Jobbers' Profits. Wholesalers' or Jobbers' profits should not exceed more than 15 or 25 cents per hundred pounds above the delivered cost of their sugar. In no case must the margin exceed the prewar margin so that if the margin was less than 15 cents such dealers' margin now should be less than 15 cents.

2. Retailers' Profit. The gross margin cost for sugar sales by retailers should not exceed one cent a pound over the delivered cost of such sugar. This figure has been adopted by the Food Administration as a guide in determining whether in any particular case an unreasonable profit has been exacted. Every case will be judged on its merits. Retailers not licensed will be subject to this rule as completely as if licensed, as supplies will be shut off for failure to observe it. Sugar costs the wholesaler \$7.45 per hundred plus freight. If you add the net cost to the retailer for example when sugar costs \$7.45 per hundred and freight amounts to 30 cents the wholesalers' cost would be \$7.75. Add to this 15 to 25 cents for his profit and you have \$7.90 or \$8.00 as the delivered cost to the retailer. Now add one cent per pound or \$1.00 per hundred for the retailers' margin and you have the price to the consumer, which should be about nine cents, but in no case more than 9 1/4 cents per pound.

**GOVERNMENT CALLS FARM WAR MEETING**

Sends Special Representative for Series of Five Gatherings in State.

Columbia, Mo., March 19.—A series of five war meetings will be held in Missouri from March 26 to 30, inclusive. These meetings, it was announced here today, are a direct result of Government recognition of the war activities of Missouri farmers. The first meeting will be held in Hannibal, March 26. Other meetings will be held in Chillicothe, March 27; St. Joseph, March 28; Sedalia, March 29; and Springfield, March 30.

W. M. Jardine, President of the Kansas State Agriculture College, has been named as the special representative of the Federal Government to meet the farmers in these different sections of the state. President Jardine is now in Washington, D. C., conferring with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Federal Food Administration, the War Department, and other divisions of the Government. Paul B. Naylor, of the University of Missouri College of Agriculture will attend the meetings in Hannibal, St. Joseph, Sedalia and Springfield with President Jardine. S. M. Jordan, county agent of Chariton County, will be with President Jardine at the Chillicothe meeting.

Farmers were never more busy than they are right now. The Federal Government is fully aware of this situation. The war, however, must go on. President Jardine brings an up-to-the-minute message direct from the National Capital to the farm folks of Missouri. He will carry Missouri's response back to Washington.

Arrangements are being made for delegations of farmers from neighboring counties to attend the meetings in the different sections of the state. Officers of farmers' organizations, county agents, teachers, county, town and township officers, members of the County Councils of Defense, bankers and other business men will assist in making up delegations of farmers from the various communities.
