

An Unusual January.
January, 1919, in Missouri was 18 degrees warmer than January, 1918, which was the coldest on record, according to the Weather Bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture. The monthly mean temperature for January, 1919, for the state, was 34 degrees above zero.

January, 1919, was the driest January in 52 years. Of the 83 stations reporting, 8 received no precipitation at all, 7 had a slight trace only, and 34 received one-tenth of an inch or less.

The number of hours of sunshine was 256, which was 73 per cent of the daylight possible, and 22 per cent greater than normal. The number of clear days in January, 1919, exceeded all previous records for this month since official records were first recorded.
