thousands.

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Regardless of the criticism of the McCullough-Morgan amendment to the Hawes road law by metropolitan newspapers those familiar with road building in the state say the amendment makes the measure more workable. This information was given Governor Gardner by the Highway Commission and Attorney General McAllister after the bill was passed. Judge O. W. Hackworth, of Wayne county, who worked more on the Hawes law than anyone save Harry B. Hawes, says the amendment is a good one. The provisions of the amendments are: All roads are located on inspection by the Highway Department; each county complying with the law gets \$60,000 to be paid in three yearly installments of \$20,000 each; roads must be adaptable and cost not less than an average of \$1,200 per mile, one-half of the excess cost to be paid by county; no county can participate that does not levy 25c special road and bridge tax. Governor Gardner has signed it.

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The remainder of the session will be spent by both branches in passing bill from the other branch. No measures which have not passed one branch will be considered.
