

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LAFAYETTE DEMOCRATS HOLD CONVENTION

First County Convention With Women Delegates Was Very Satisfactory.

The township delegates representing the Democratic party met in Higginsville Monday and put through the business of the convention with dispatch. The women had equal representation in the convention and proved themselves equal to all emergencies arising in the performance of their duties as delegates.

Walter Gresham of Lexington, was chosen temporary chairman, and Mrs. Felix G. Young, also of Lexington, temporary secretary. The permanent organization had Hon. Jas. P. Chinn of Higginsville, as chairman, and Mrs. W. E. Ewing of Odessa, secretary.

Resolutions were adopted endorsing the National, State and County administrations, and instructing delegates to the state convention to vote against Senator Jas. A. Reed as a delegate at large to the national convention.

At a meeting of the Educational Commission, held in Nashville, Tenn., recently, \$350,000.00 was apportioned to Central College for Women. The plan is to use this fund for College endowment.

This announcement will be received with enthusiasm by the alumnae and former students of the College. It assures the restoration of a four years' course of study, and opens the way for the realization of the plans of the church, that a college of the highest grade be established at Lexington, for the education of girls and young women. This purpose has never been lost sight of, even when conditions demanded its present classification.—Central Messenger.


Reception At Christian Church.
