Diploma From State Teachers' College.

County Superintendent of Schools, Elmer H. White, is to receive his 90 hour diploma from Central Missouri State Teachers' College, at Warrensburg, Mo., Thursday, May 27th, 1920. By doing a little work by correspondence during the past winter he has made it possible to receive this recognition by the State of Missouri. Mr. White received his 60 hour diploma from the same school at the end of the summer term of 1917. He hopes to be able to take out the 120 hour diploma offered by the College within a few summers. It is his intention to attend School at Warrensburg this coming summer beginning about June 2nd. It is a ten weeks course, closing August 6th. Last Summer he was in school at Warrensburg and drove to Lexington each week end and was in his office on Friday evenings and Saturdays. It is his plan to do the same thing this year, thereby taking advantage of the school and keeping right up with the times educationally, as well as keeping his office work right up to date all the time. During the summer months the school work at his office is not so urgent, but what it can be handled at the end of the week.

PARADE PLANS.

The following arrangements for the American Legion Day Parade are announced for the information of all concerned.

Officers in charge: Col. C. E. Mitchell, Grand Marshal; Major Ralph W. Campbell, Capt. J. M. Sellers, and E. M. Taubman, Aids.

Assembly places: The 140th Infantry Band will form on Highland Avenue at head of and facing east on Main Street.

The American Legion will form on South Highland Avenue facing north, head of column at head of Main St.

The World War Veterans will form on Highland Avenue, facing north and just south of the American Legion.

The Civil War Veterans, Blue and Gray, are requested to assemble on Broadway in front of the Morris Hotel, where decorated cars will be waiting for them.

The Spanish War Veterans are requested to assemble on Broadway in front of the Morris Hotel.

The Wentworth Military Academy Band, Battalion, and accompanying artillery will form on Highland Avenue, south of the World War Veterans.

The Concordia Band will form on north Highland Avenue, facing south and near head of Main Street.

Fraternal Orders will form on North Highland Avenue, facing south, in the following order:

- Knights of Pythias, Odd Fellows, Red Men, Modern Woodmen, Eagles, Moose, Woodmen of the World, United Mine Workers of America, Elks.

Floats: All floats will be assembled on North Highland Avenue north of fraternal orders. Organizations having floats may have floats accompanying them in the parade if they desire.

Route of March: From Highland Avenue down Main Street to 20th Street, south on 20th Street to South Street, west on South Street to Amelia Avenue, down Amelia Avenue to Taubman Field.

Order of Units in Parade: 140th Infantry Band, American Legion, World War Veterans, Civil War Veterans, Spanish War Veterans, Wentworth Military Academy, Concordia Band, Fraternal Orders and Floats.

It is desired to start this parade on time. It is therefore urged that all participants be in designated assembly places promptly at 9:30 a. m. so that the parade may start at ten o'clock.

Parade Headquarters where information may be secured will be located at the corner of Broadway and Main Streets.
