HELD COMMON SENSE VIEW

Colonel Roosevelt's Idea of the Propriety of Establishing Proper Game Preserves. In his "African Game Trails," Colonel Roosevelt wrote: "Game preserves should not be established where they are detrimental to the interests of large bodies of settlers, nor yet should they be nominally established in regions so remote that the only men really interested with are those who respect the law, while a premium is thereby put on the activity of the unscrupulous persons who are eager to break it. "There should be certain sanctuaries and nurseries where game can live and breed absolutely unmolested; and elsewhere the laws should, so far as possible, provide for the continued existence of the game in sufficient numbers to allow a reasonable amount of hunting on fair terms to any hardy and vigorous man fond of the sport, and yet not in sufficient numbers to jeopardize the interests of the actual settler, the tiller of the soil, the man whose well-being should be the prime object to be kept in mind by every statesman. Game butchery is as objectionable as any other form of wanton cruelty or barbarity; but to protest against all hunting of game is a sign of softness of head, not of soundness of heart."

LOST FORTUNE IN RUBLES

A debtor who, in 1914, borrowed 750,000 Russian rubles, then worth about \$300,000, can now repay in full with \$250, Judge Russell has decided in the chancery division of the royal courts of justice at London. However, a stay of execution was granted with a view to an appeal.

The parties were the British Bank of Foreign Trade, which borrowed the 750,000 rubles from the Russian Commercial and Industrial bank against securities which the borrower now seeks to redeem. The lending bank, however, insisted on payment of \$300,000 in sterling. The judge held that the loan was a ruble loan repayable in rubles, either imperial Romanoff, Kerensky or soviet issues, whichever were available. Soviet rubles were quoted at about 60 for a penny at the time of the court's decision.

MUSIC HELPS INVALIDS

Discussing Fritz Kreisler's belief that the musician is a valuable aid to the doctor in treating disease, W. D. Moffat, editor of the Mentor Magazine, tells of the experience of an English scientist who found that he could grip an object harder when heroic music was played, and whose grip was correspondingly weaker when a lullaby was played. This indicates, the writer points out, that music has a discernible effect on mind and body.

NEW LIGHT WORKS WELL

Railroad signal experiments made at Waterloo station, London, favor the "three-position light system." The filaments are in the focus of a dioptric lens of white glass; the rays, emerging through greenish-yellow glass, can be seen for more than 1,000 yards in bright sunlight, and penetrate fog better than white light.—Scientific American.
