## NORTH AND SOUTH HIGHWAY CERTAIN

### Mr. Gary Says Commission Has The Power And Will Build The Road.

Theodore Gary, Chairman of the State Highway Commission, puts the commission on record as favoring a north and south highway through Lexington, in case a bridge is built across the river at this point. He says a hard surface road will be built from Higginsville to Lexington and also from the point opposite of Lexington to Richmond and on to the road connecting at Hamilton.

Dear Mr. McGrew:-

Referring to our conversation as to what the State Highway Commission's attitude would be in case a free bridge was built across the river at Lexington, I can say for you and your associates' information that the commission is empowered and will build a hard surface road from Lexington to Higginsville and also from the point opposite Lexington to Richmond and on to the road connecting at Hamilton. This road will be of the type to meet the needs of the traffic over such a road.

## SPECIAL ELECTION TUESDAY SEPTEMBER 5TH

Petition Bearing 309 Names Presented to County Court Petitioning For Bond Election.

The court ordered the election for Tuesday, September 5, 1922 and named the polling places.
