

EDITOR DANA INDICTED.

TRUE BILL FOUND AGAINST HIM FOR CRIMINAL LIBEL.

William A. Laffan, Publisher of the "Sun" Also Involves and the Complaint Is Frank H. Noyes of the Associated Press.

Washington, March 7.—The grand jury for the supreme court of the District of Columbia has returned an indictment for criminal libel against Charles A. Dana, editor of the New York Sun. The indictment was formally made to Judge Clegg, presiding, by the foreman of the jury today. It is a formidable document of many pages, setting forth the malicious motives of Messrs. Dana and Laffan in their libelous attack on Frank H. Noyes, of Washington, proprietor of the Evening Star, and one of the board of directors and of the executive committee of the Associated Press. The District Supreme court is a United States court and according to the procedure of such courts, District Attorney Hiram will transmit a certified copy of the indictment to the district attorney for the Southern district of New York, located in New York city. It will be returned to the Southern district of New York, where the States' attorney will file a return on the indictment, will lead a venire to appear at the trial of the accused. The amount of the bail, the accused have the right of applying for a writ of habeas corpus to prevent the transmission of the indictment to New York and the arrest of the accused will be made in a day or two.
