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BLAMABLE DISTANCE.

It Takes a Thousand Years for the Light of Some Stars to Reach Us.

From the Chautauquan. While, however, it is interesting to know the distance of some of the stars in miles, when stated in that way the numbers are so large that they are almost completely unintelligible to the mind.

For this reason it is customary to estimate the distance of stars in light years. The light year is the distance that light, moving at the rate of 186,000 miles per second, travels in one year. This amount is 5,846,000,000 miles. The distance of Alpha Centauri, the nearest star to our sun, is about 4.2 light years.

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
