Bying by the Million.

Ottawa, Kas., June 8.—(Special.) A representative of Professor Snow visited Wellsville the other day to introduce the new process of spraying infection among chickens. He was accompanied by a patriotic, he learned that bugs were dying by the millions. Investigation showed that infected bugs had been placed on the run from the chicken pens, which are now showing themselves, as above related. Twenty-five farms were visited and at all of them the chickens were found to be dying in large numbers.

Fire at Wellington, Kas.

Wellington, Kas., June 8.—(Special.) About 2 o'clock this morning fire broke out in a small room in the rear of Hackney & Cocher's meat market and rapidly spread west and south. The building was mostly frame, and the fire was exceedingly difficult to check. The principal losses: Hackney & Cocher's, \$10,000; Davison, \$5,000; and the fire department house and bell tower, \$500. The estimated loss is \$15,500. The building erected on the townsite, built of cutwood logs, was among those consumed.

A Burglar Captured.

Atchison, Kas., June 8.—(Special.) Cliff Holbert, an attorney, captured a burglar who was discovered in the residence of A. H. Harvey, real agent of the Missouri Pacific, at Atchison, Mo. Harvey is a well-known citizen and has been a member of the local militia. Holbert, who lives in the same neighborhood, was alerted by his alarm, and seeing the burglar in his room, he called to the police station. The burglar was taken to the police station. The rings were in his hand when arrested.

Found With His Throat Cut.

Salina, Kas., June 8.—(Special.) The dead body of a man was found in a shallow well in the morning lying near the Union Pacific rail road track, about twenty miles west of this place. His throat was cut and he had a bloody razor in his pocket, which was an early razor, and a small tin of shaving soap and a shaving brush. A N. C. (Kas.) paper signed J. D. A STRONG WHEAT MARKET.

AFTER A DECLINE OF 1c THE CEREAL CLOSED WITH A GAIN OF 1 1/2c.

The Other Grains Sympathized With the Advance in Wheat and Brought Higher Prices—Provisions Made Slight Advances.

Chicago, June 8.—Wheat turned from quite weak early in the session to very strong at the close on further crop damage reports. After declining to 96c per bushel in the highest value, made in the evening when it rose 2c and closed at 98c for July, which is the rice since the close yesterday, and is the highest closing price so far this season.

Corn, oats and provisions sympathized with the strength in wheat. Oats are higher, while corn only gained 1c, and pork, lard and ribs are but modestly advanced.

Although the first sales of wheat were at from 96c to 97c per bushel over the price at the close yesterday, the opening was comparatively tame. There were no new features in the surroundings of the market. The weather was still dry in the wheat area and wet in the spring wheat region.

The chief items of early news comprised the publication of the state crop reports of Michigan and Illinois, and the purchase of the wheat movement. The Michigan report gave the average condition of the wheat crop as about 90 per cent, and the Illinois report gave the average for the state at 82 per cent, as compared with 80 per cent last year.

These reports, had as was the state of affairs they indicated, were not quite so bad as the imagination of some of the speculators had pictured the conditions, and consequently their effect was less than had been expected. The Argentine shipments were smaller for the week, according to a private Liverpool cable, but the grain as a piece of news, fell flat in consequence of having been expected.

The week's shipments of wheat and flour, as published by Bradstreet's, amounted from both states to 2,500,000 bushels; 500,000 bushels of which were in the Pacific side. The total on the week before was 2,600,000 bushels, and the average for the week of last year 2,720,000 bushels. The aggregate decrease of wheat and flour in the United States and Canada, according to the Daily Trade Bulletin, was 19,322,000 bushels, and deducting an increase of 1,000,000 bushels in Europe and Asia, the net amount of the world's decrease for May was 18,322,000 bushels. The market acted rather heavy for our hour of more, and the price advanced to 98c for July, and 97c for August, but it was not until the close that it reached 98c, the closing price being 98c, and the opening price 97c.

The price advanced, but surely declined to 97c for July, and 96c for August, and the decline was helped by advices from St. Louis of the arrival there of a carload of new wheat from Kansas, and other telegrams of the same nature. The market was very active, but the receipts are giving no signs of increasing. The inspection in store today was 25 cars, and the outward inspection was 30 cars. The total amount of wheat in the country is estimated to be 1,000,000 bushels, and the closing price being 98c, as against 95c yesterday.

For a Saturday business day, the market was very active. Further reports of crop damage making the condition much more unfavorable than it has been, created some anxiety among shorts, and there was free buying by them. Trading was heavy, and principally general, July started at from 96c to 97c, and closed at 98c.


