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A CRISIS AT OMAHA.

CONFLICT INEVITABLE BETWEEN THE RIVAL POLICE FACTIONS.

COMPROMISE MEASURES FAIL. A. P. A. MEN SAY THEY WILL TAKE POSSESSION TOMORROW.

HEADQUARTERS BARRICADED.

NEARLY THE ENTIRE POLICE FORCE KEPT IN READINESS FOR AN ATTACK.

The Men Are Armed With Revolvers, Clubs and Pick Handles and Will Make a Sturdy Resistance Behind Temporary Defenses—Much Unrest in City.

Omaha, Neb., Aug. 12.—It now looks as if conflict is inevitable between the Omaha police force and the A. P. A. faction, which claims authority under a recent law to appoint a new police force.

On the return the night Hon. A. J. Balfour, secretary of the A. P. A., and other members of the A. P. A. arrived in Omaha today.

The police headquarters resembles a barracks today. The disquieting rumors which are flying around, according to the police, are the basis for the precautions taken in protecting the headquarters from assault and capture in the event of a riot.

The police are armed with their clubs and short-barreled revolvers and are lined up in the streets of the city.

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ILLINOIS SOLD FOR SILVER.

Chairman Heinrichson Speaks Very Enthusiastically of the Prospects for the White Faction in the Snicker State.

Springfield, Ill., Aug. 12.—Secretary of State Heinrichson, chairman of the Democratic state central committee, speaking of the national conference of silver men to be held in Washington August 11, said today that Illinois would be represented by a large delegation of leading and influential Democrats.

The gold Democrats, he says, could not carry a single county in the state. A free coinage bill, he says, would be introduced in the Eighteenth district.

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PHILADELPHIA.

The City of Brotherly Love Visited by a Blaze Causing a Loss of \$100,000.

Philadelphia, Aug. 12.—A fire which did damage amounting to between \$250,000 and \$300,000 started in the big five-story building occupied by Brown & Bailey as a paper box manufacturing plant.

The fire originated on the first floor of the building occupied by Brown & Bailey, at 42 Franklin street, between Second and Third streets.

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
