

PLAN OF REORGANIZATION.

OREGON RAILWAY AND NAVIGATION COMPANY'S SCHEME MADE PUBLIC.

A New Corporation Will Issue \$24,500,000 4 Per Cent Bonds as Second Mortgage—Grand Army Business—New Freight Service to Liverpool.

New York, Aug. 21.—The plan and agreement for the reorganization of the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company has been made public. It proposes the formation of a new corporation, which will issue \$24,500,000 4 per cent, fifty year gold bonds, to be a second mortgage on property covered by the present first mortgage, and a first mortgage on all the other property of the new company. The new bonds will be distributed as follows: \$2,500,000 at par to existing consolidated mortgage bondholders; \$2,500,000 at 2 per cent, for the existing collateral trust bonds; \$3,500,000 reserved to retire existing first mortgage bonds; \$1,000,000 reserved for betterments and terminals; and \$2,000,000 reserved for extensions to not more than \$30,000 per mile of road.

NEW LINE TO EUROPE.

The Louisville & Nashville Freight Service, Pensacola to Liverpool.

Louisville, Ky., Aug. 21.—The Louisville & Nashville road has perfected negotiations for the inauguration of a steamship freight service between this country and Europe, the vessels to ply between Pensacola and Liverpool. The ships to be put into the line are of immense capacity and are the property of the United States Shipping Company, of New York. The first ship will leave on the 25th of August, and monthly sailings are to be guaranteed. The service will be to Pensacola, and will be a first-class service, should traffic justify such an extension of the service, ships will be sent to Liverpool fortnightly instead of monthly.

A NEW KANSAS RAILROAD.

It Will Traverse Atchison, Jackson, Jefferson and Shawnee Counties.

Topeka, Kas., Aug. 21.—(Special.) The Atchison, Topeka & St. Joseph Railroad Company filed articles of incorporation in the office of the secretary of state today, with a capitalization of \$3,000,000. The directors are: A. H. Horton, Bailey P. Wagener, W. P. Way, J. W. Orr, C. N. Henthorn, S. E. Harburger and Charles C. King. The purpose of the company is to build through Atchison, Jackson, Jefferson and Shawnee counties, and to cross the Missouri river at St. Joseph.

C. P. Huntington May Be Rearrested.

San Francisco, Aug. 21.—According to the American Railway Union members and their friends, C. P. Huntington will be arrested should he come here. It is contended the charge against the president of the Southern Pacific was dismissed at the instance of the Missouri Pacific, but that Huntington could still be arrested here.

The Monon's Statement Withheld.

Chicago, Aug. 21.—Vice President and General Manager McLeod of the Monon road, left here for New York to-day, carrying with him the statement of the earnings and operating expenses of the road for the last year. He declined to make public the figures, it is stated, until they have been laid before the directors and had been approved. The statement is an exceptionally satisfactory one considering the time it was made. It is the best in the history of the road.

The Burlington's Omaha Excursion.

The Burlington railroad will run an excursion to Omaha to-morrow, leaving the Union depot at 9 o'clock. Tickets selling at \$2.50 for the round trip. This is simply returning the compliment to Omaha as that city sent us a large Sunday delegation recently. The prospects are for a big excursion. When the Omaha papers protested against the Burlington's making such rates to Kansas City, Assistant General Passenger Agent F. H. H. replied that Kansas City could send that town 10,000 people every Sunday and not miss them.

OF INTEREST TO STOCKMEN.

HIGHER PRICES FOR CATTLE AFFECTING THE EXPORT TRADE.

The Record of Freight Shipments for the Week Ending August 18 Shows a Decided Falling Off, but There is a Gain in Sheep Exports.

The higher price for good cattle this year continues to have its influence upon the foreign cattle and dressed beef trade. The foreign exports of cattle from the Atlantic ports for the week ending August 18 were 3,291 head, against 11,230 for the same week last year, and quarters of beef, 11,230 against 19,130 the same week last year. But while there has been loss in the cattle and beef business, there has been a handsome growth in the sheep business abroad, brought about by the better quality and cheapness of American sheep this year. The exports for the week ending August 18 were 12,767, against 9,854 the week previous, and 3,238 the same week last year.
