MAY NOT BE TAYLOR.

SOME DOUBT AS TO IDENTITY OF THE CALIFORNIA PRISONER.

DISCREPANCY IN DESCRIPTIONS

HEIGHTS OF TAYLOR AND THE PRISONER DO NOT TALLY.

Officers, However, Are Sure They Have Meeks Murderer-Significant Remark Made by Aspect to Sayers, Missourian.

Hanford, Feb. 1.—(Special.) L. E. Crookshank, a school teacher residing near Visalia, called at the jail today in order to identify the man held there as George Taylor, the Missouri murderer. He could not positively identify the prisoner as Taylor, owing to the number of years that has elapsed since he knew him. He thinks he is the man. His only doubt is regarding the height of the two men. He states that Taylor is taller than the prisoner, but is not certain, as otherwise the similarity is remarkable.

James Sayers, also of Missouri, is doubtful, too, in regard to height. Sheriff Buckner attaches little importance to the opinion of both Sayers and Crookshank, as they have not seen Taylor for many years. Taylor will neither identify the man held there as ever in Missouri. He claims that he is a graduate of a business college in Minnesota, and urges Buckner to write back and inquire regarding him. On the suggestion being made, Taylor has been sent here for identification. Taylor laughed and replied that he could never be recognized by the photograph taken of him here.

H. F. Lane, the young man whose information led to Taylor's arrest, is positive in his identification of the man under arrest as Taylor. Lane last saw Taylor in 1885 while the latter was on trial for the murder of the Meeks family. Lane is a painter, a recent arrival from Taylor's home in Missouri, and is related to Taylor by marriage, Taylor's wife being a cousin of Lane's.

Sheriff Buckner, late this afternoon, entered Taylor's cell and requested him to undergo, as he wished to search for identification marks. Taylor refused, and a sharp tussle ensued, ending by Taylor being heavily thrown, his head striking against a projection in the wall.

Taylor arose and agreed to undergo, which he did without further incident. A patient, a recent arrival from Taylor's home in Missouri, and is related to Taylor by marriage, Taylor's wife being a cousin of Lane's.

A FAMILY OF BURGLARS.

Father, Mother and Son Under Arrest for a Robbery.

Fort Scott, Kas., Feb. 1.—(Special.) A family of burglars, consisting of father, mother and son, were captured by police to-day near this city, and are now in jail. Early this morning the party, which was known, but in a very general way, as the general store of Love Bros., a few miles west of here, a clerk sleeping in the building, was fired at by the burglars. The burglars escaped, but the clerk was badly injured. The young man, who is quite likely the father of the family, is in jail, and his parents, and that their name is Cooper.

GOT THE HOT END OF IT.

Chicago Railroad Office Clerks Badly Used Up in Some Unexplained Manner.

Chicago, Feb. 1.—W. S. Werth, assistant cashier in the Washburn freight depot, and J. H. Mitchell, a clerk in the same office, at the hospital, the result of injuries received last night. They claim to have been set upon by two men, who, after beating them, took them to a saloon, where they were shot. Two of the bullets took effect in Werth and one in Mitchell. Both, however, will recover. The men who shot at them were seen by the assistants while in a house or saloon in the neighborhood, and finished the fight in the street.

Hermit Murdered by Robbers.

Ain Arbor, Mich., Feb. 1.—James Richards, an eccentric farmer, who lived a hermit life in the woods, was shot dead by robbers early Sunday morning. He formerly had considerable money in the house, but had run it down to a bank. He was evidently defended himself desperately, and the robbers were killed. The fatal shot was fired. The thieves obtained about \$50 and escaped.

Sent to Prison for Life.

Akron, O., Feb. 1.—Romulus Cotell, who killed Alin Stone and wife and Ira Stillson at Zalimade last March, was allowed to plead guilty to the murder of the latter degree to-day. Judge Kohler at once sentenced him to life imprisonment at hard labor in the state prison. He was in the first trial and was sentenced to hang November 6.

Murder at Mexico, Mo.

Mexico, Mo., Feb. 1.—(Special.) An old musket and bad whiskey gave this county four victims to-day. Henry Taylor, colored, shot and instantly killed Lee Smith, colored, while in a row. The coroner says the murderer is in jail. He refuses to talk.

Suicide at Clinton, Mo.

Clinton, Mo., Feb. 1.—(Special.) Thomas Ryan, colored, shot himself here just after 10 o'clock to-night by shooting his rifle into the head with a pistol. He was 66 years old and was in the winter here, and leaves a widow, who is in Chicago. He was a sufferer from asthmatic trouble.

Accused Murderer Acquitted.

Eureka Springs, Ark., Feb. 1.—(Special.) Hurska, charged with the murder of his mother-in-law, Sarah Lamb, has been acquitted at Harrison. Mrs. Lamb has been in the hospital since the first trial and is getting supper, by an unknown assassin, who fired through a window.

Pittsburg, Kas., Depot Robbed.

Pittsburg, Kas., Feb. 1.—(Special.) Burglars entered the Kansas City, Pittsburg & Omaha depot here to-day, and stole a small sum of money, probably being frightened away.

Car Thief Captured.

Ahrens, Kas., Feb. 1.—(Special.) J. S. Crowley, who is charged with stealing goods from a car here, was captured to-day in Missouri. Many valuable articles are missing.

Fatally Shot by Her Lover.

Chicago, Feb. 1.—Ollie Sullivan, 16 years old, was shot to death here to-day by her lover in Irving avenue by Frank J. Laver. The murder was the result of a lovers' quarrel.

Drowned in the Marais des Cygnes.

Ottawa, Kas., Feb. 1.—(Special.) Scott Hunt, the 3-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Hunt of this city, was drowned in the Marais des Cygnes here at noon to-day, while playing upon the ice. The body was recovered. This is the second son of Mr. and Mrs. Hunt that has drowned in the Marais des Cygnes. The first was Raymond, having drowned nearly the same place some five years ago.

Seminary Dormitory Burned.

Lima, N. Y., Feb. 1.—The boys' dormitory of the Genesee Wesleyan seminary at this place, which was valued at \$100,000, was totally destroyed by fire this morning. There were about 100 boys in the building, but no one was hurt. The fire was caused by a gas lamp. The valuable library of the seminary is entirely destroyed. The entire loss was about \$100,000.

Fast in an Ice Floe.

Chicago, Feb. 1.—The tug Van Ralle is fast in an ice floe somewhere in the open lake and when last seen was drifting rapidly toward the city. The tug was in the evening an attempt was made by the tug Jesse Spaulding to go to the rescue. After the tug had been abandoned, about ten men are on the tug.

Kalamazoo High School Burned.

Kalamazoo, Mich., Feb. 1.—The high school building here, valued at \$100,000, was destroyed by fire to-day. The loss was about \$100,000. The cause of the fire is not known.

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TO SUCCEED MORTON.

JAMES WILSON, OF IOWA, TO BE SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE.

HAS ACCEPTED THE POSITION.

IS A MEMBER OF THE IOWA AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE FACULTY.

Professor of Agriculture and Experiment Station Director—McKenna, of California, Likely to Be Attorney General—Long for the Navy.

Des Moines, Ia., Feb. 1.—Ex-Congressman James Wilson, of Iowa, announced to-night his acceptance of the cabinet portfolio recently tendered him by President-elect McKinley. Topoka, Kas., Feb. 1.—(Special.) The house to-day promptly sat down on the senate concurrent resolution to "instruct the Kansas delegation in congress to work and vote for free silver." When it came up, Barclay, of Elk, moved to postpone action on it indefinitely and the motion carried without debate. The house then adjourned to meet to-morrow night.

Put a Price on Dead Stock.

Topoka, Kas., Feb. 1.—(Special.) An act fixing the amount a railroad company is liable for the killing of its stock by a train, was introduced to-day by Tapscott, of Hamilton. It provides that railroads shall be liable for the killing of stock by a train, in the following amounts: \$10 for sheep, \$20 for cattle, \$30 for horses, \$40 for mules, \$50 for pigs, \$60 for cows, and \$70 for calves.

A "Hurry-Up" Bill Killed.

Topoka, Kas., Feb. 1.—(Special.) The house judiciary committee to-day killed one of its "hurry-up" bills. The bill was intended to hurry up courts in rendering their opinions. It was reported that the bill should be held up on him for three months as a penalty for his failure to report it. The bill was submitted to him within thirty days.

Van Diver Bill Will Pass.

Topoka, Kas., Feb. 1.—(Special.) The house committee on judicial appointments to-day reported favorably on the Van Diver bill to abolish Judge Vandiver's judicial district. The senate committee has also reported favorably on the bill. The bill will be passed.

The Weight of Kaffir Corn.

Topoka, Kas., Feb. 1.—(Special.) The house committee of the whole agreed to-day to pass a bill fixing the weight of kaffir corn. The bill provides that kaffir corn shall weigh 52 pounds per bushel, and white at 52 pounds.

Attorneys Must Be Lawyers.

Topoka, Kas., Feb. 1.—(Special.) The judiciary committee of the house has prepared a bill to require that attorneys be lawyers. The bill provides that no one shall be admitted to the bar unless he is a lawyer.

SENATOR HARRIS WRATHY.
