The amount of plunder secured by the Glendale train robbers, last week, is now set down at \$6900; quite a falling off from \$30,000 as at first reported.

A vigilance committee has been organized at Ansville, Lafayette county to hunt down thieves and bring them to punishment.

A temporary injunction has been granted against the Life Association of America, restraining it from doing further business, and Gen. D. M. Frost has been appointed temporary receiver.

A special dispatch from Belton, Cass county, Missouri, reports a rich discovery of Gold in Cass county and the people have all gone crazy about it. The discovery won't wash.

The Omaha extension of the St. Louis Kansas City & North-western railroad from Brunswick, has been completed and in a few days trains will be run through from St. Louis to Omaha on this line.

The Ute Indians have accomplished one good work. They killed a sanctified Indian agent on one of their reservations. If they could kill off all the Indian agents we would have less trouble with the Indians.

Carl Schurz, the secretary of the Interior, is mad, and says the Ute Indians must be severely punished for killing an Indian agent. He don't care much about the score or more of soldiers they killed, but that Indian agent was precious property.

The Greenbackers in Wyandotte county, Kansas did the most sensible thing they could have done. They endorsed the county Democratic ticket. The only hope for Greenback principles in this country is through the Democratic party.

A young man named Octave Inlow, was assassinated by some negroes at Mexico, last week. The guilty parties have been arrested and are now in jail awaiting a legal investigation. A bad negro from Sturgeon did the shooting.

The sale of the St. Louis Times Journal to Mr. James P. Deck by B. M. Chambers about six weeks since, fell through last week, on account of the conditions of the trade not being met. The paper falls back to Mr. Chambers, who will continue the publication of the paper as heretofore.

In this paper, a couple of weeks since, we gave an account of the capture of John Todd, near Sturgeon, Boone county, by the sheriff of Charlton county. He was brought to Keytesville and incarcerated in jail, but last week he knocked the jailer down and escaped. He is charged with cattle stealing and other irregularities.

A woman giving her name as Winfrey, hired a horse and buggy, in Chillicothe, one day last week, for a few hours recreation, but instead of returning it, lit out for Carrollton, where she was arrested and with the horse and buggy returned to Chillicothe, where her case will be tried before Judge Broadus.

A man named D. E. Morrow, went to Carrollton about 6 weeks ago and opened out business as a dental surgeon. He got trusted for some printing at the Carrollton Democrat office and for board at the Gittings House. After being in closer in this way for a month and a half he jumped the town and left all bills unpaid.

OHIO

The indications are, from the returns received, that Ohio went Republican on Tuesday last by a majority of at least ten thousand votes. Both parties made a gallant fight, but Ohio seems to be wedded to her idols and cannot be relied on by the Democracy. It has been disputed ground for the past four years, and will no doubt continue to be in the future, as both parties have carried the state repeatedly during that time. The Republican party spent a large amount of money to carry it this time, but as they have control of the Government offices and the U. S. Treasury, they can do the same thing on any other occasion.

A communication from Thos. P. Montfort is given a place in this issue, on the fourth page. We print this that the ideas set forth by a leading Greenbacker in the county may be known. It was our intention to write an article on the subject this week, but a careful examination of the communication convinces us that it is too absurd to deceive any person, and besides there is nothing to be gained by a discussion of this question now. The Greenback movement was a creature of circumstance. The hard times, brought about by the contraction policy of John Sherman, made men restless and created within them a desire to do something to better their condition and they seized upon the Greenback movement as a bare hope. If prosperity returns to this country, as the general aspect of the country now indicates the Greenback movement will gradually sink out of existence. It has never yet risen to the importance of being considered a competitor of the Democracy in any democratic state, the fact is that it is scarcely known in one half the states in the Union, hence the statement that the contest is now between the Greenbackers and the Republicans is the sheerest nonsense. The fact is, in this case "the wish is father to the thought." The Democrats now control over half the states in the Union and are steadily gaining ground, as the history of the past ten years clearly proves. The Greenback movement is simply a side issue to give dissatisfied politicians an opportunity to air themselves before the public.

Over forty-two millions of the new standard silver dollars have been coined and of this sum thirty-one millions are yet in the United States Treasury, leaving only eleven millions in circulation. John Sherman, Republican Secretary of the Treasury was opposed to the passage of the law authorizing the coinage of dollars of this class, and has used every means in his power to keep them out of circulation. The policy of Sherman is to keep all the money he can locked up in the treasury so as to keep it out of circulation. The gold and silver on hand now, and of course idle, will aggregate nearly three hundred millions of dollars. This could be used without detriment in paying off that amount of our bonded indebtedness and thus save a large sum annually in interest to the tax payers, but that would put the money in circulation and spoil the schemes of some of the eastern money sharks. This being the case Sherman will not entertain the proposition a moment. The money power and their wishes are held sacred by all Republican leaders. The success of the Democratic party is the only relief the people can expect from this truckling to the money power to the detriment of the people.

A Democratic paper is published at New Boston, Illinois, but it don't suit the views of the Republicans in that section, and they propose to suppress it. Hence a notice signed "Regulator" has been sent to the editor, giving him ten days notice to leave, threatening him that they, the "regulators" will throw his press in the bottom of the Mississippi river if he don't leave. One of the most terrible railroad accidents that ever occurred in this country, happened at Jackson, Michigan, on Friday night last. A passenger train run into a freight, killing over 20 persons and wounding nearly three times as many more. The accident was caused by gross carelessness on the part of the freight train men. The persons killed were mostly Canadians on their way to the pines of Wisconsin.

This statement is guess-work, as no information on that point has been obtained.
