Court Proceedings

The two-weeks term of civil court is still in session, Judge Memminger presiding. Many cases have been continued, and below will be found a list of the cases tried up to yesterday afternoon:

Bank of Cheraw vs C. L. Langly and M. B. Smith. Verdict for plaintiff against M. B. Smith for \$330.

West-winfree Tobacco Co. vs McBee Supply Co. about a shipment of tobacco. Verdict for plaintiff for \$162.45.

Hurst-Streater Co. vs H. M. Steen. Verdict for plaintiff for \$216.03.

Mrs. Virginia A. Pigg vs S. A. L. railway. A suit for damages for the death of her husband at McBee in 1912. Compromised for \$3800.05.

H. J. Sellers Co. vs M. L. Pate. Judgement for \$175.

Beasley Shoe Co. vs Directors of Union Distributing Co. 1st case, verdict for \$753.73; second case \$757.74.

McBee Supply Co. vs Tippett and Hancock Verdict for \$810.84.

I. P. Simpson vs Mungo Live Stock Co. Verdict for plaintiff for \$282.50.

J. W. Miller vs C. M. & C. railway. Verdict for \$4062.45.

L. D. Ogburn vs C. M. & C. railway. Verdict for plaintiff \$737.55.

Most important case tried last week was the one of Willcox, Ives Co., a large fertilizer Company of Savannah, Ga., vs. the Directors of the Union Distributing Co. The case was a very unusual one as suit was brought against the directors personally not for any indorsements on notes, for there were none, but for carelessness in not seeing that the manager remitted to Willcox, Ives Co., certain moneys collected by Union Dist. Co., on assigned collateral. The case was fought very hard throughout, the plaintiffs being represented by a brilliant array of counsel. The court held that a director has to exercise due care and take an interest in the corporation of which he is a director. The jury gave a verdict against the defendant for \$988.14. An appeal will be taken.

Mr. J. A. Arant, upon petition of Hanna & Hunley, representing various creditors, has been appointed by Judge Meminger receiver for Horton Bros. of Jefferson, S. C., and will collect all accounts of said Horton Bros and wind up the affairs of this firm under the orders of the court. Messrs. Hanna & Hunley are attorneys for the receiver.



