

Chesterfield Road May Not be Built

Highway department officials and the traveling public are much interested in the effort of Chesterfield county road authorities and the county delegation to arrange a plan to finance the county's part of the program to complete the Washington Atlanta highway through Chesterfield.

The state department has already allotted federal aid in the amount of \$50,000 to the project and if Chesterfield county fails to meet this sum, as has been promised, officials, it is said, will be greatly disappointed. The section in Chesterfield is an important link and at present is in bad repair, so much so that traffic is detouring around the road. An agreement was reached some time ago whereby the county was to arrange for the completion of the work, but Saturday it was learned that plans have not carried smoothly. The highway department is ready to proceed with the work, it was announced. Chesterfield authorities are to confer over the situation today and some plan may be agreed upon whereby the construction will be begun at an early date.
