DRY TICKET WINS.
The City of Asheville Votes Out the Bar Rooms.
A dispatch from Asheville, N. C., says no such sight was ever witnessed in any city of the South as was enacted there on Tuesday of last week when Asheville by a vote of nearly 1000 declared for prohibition. The polling places were thronged with women and children who boldly pleaded with the voters to vote dry.
Large delegations of women and children surrounded each polling place singing and praying during the day. The campaign for, and against prohibition, which has just closed, has been undoubtedly, the most hotly contested and keenly interesting fight of the kind in the history of Asheville.
The financial and business interests have been about equally divided, and each side has worked with much vim and vigor, the prohibitionists being led by W. H. Whitson, a prominent business man, as chairman of the executive committee, while ex-Representative J. Frazier Glenn, has acted in the same capacity for the anti-prohibitionists.
An interesting feature of the campaign has been the large number of parades organized by the prohibition forces there being parades composed of children, parades of women and children, and parades of men, the torch light parade of the prohibition voters which marched through the streets of the city Monday night being the largest of the kind ever seen in Asheville. The women of the city have taken a most active part in the fight for prohibition and their presence at the polling places in large numbers was somewhat of a novelty in elections in Asheville.

NEED MORE MONEY.
Gov. Ansel Thinks the Salary of Governor Too Small.
Governor Ansel stated Friday that in his annual message to the general assembly, which convenes in January, he will recommend that the salary of the governor be increased from \$3,000 to \$4,000, and that the state erect a new executive mansion on the site of the present building.
The governor has found, as other governors have found, that the salary paid the governor of South Carolina is inadequate and that it cost from one to two thousand dollars a year more to live in Columbia as governor than the governor receives from the State.
South Carolina has not had, in recent years at least, a governor who cares to "splurge" at all, but Governor Ansel, like most of his predecessors, has a natural ambition to maintain the dignity and position due the governor of the "greatest state in the union."
In addition to the salary, however, the state provides merely the mansion, with heat, light and water rent paid for by the state, but there is not as in other states an expense fund for the governor's use.

THE CORFSE ROSE
In the Coffin and the Mourners Left in a Hurry.
Relative of Mrs. Fred Hartsell, wife of a farmer living near Huntington, W. Va., was bemoaning her death over her coffin, a few minutes before the minister arrived to conduct the last rites, when she suddenly sat up, and with a dazed look, climbed out.
There was a rush of mourners for the open air, windows being used as exits. The mourners were terror stricken and the minister swooned when a pale-faced woman, over whose remains he had been called to conduct him at the door.
The family were too poor to have a physician, and the woman fell into a swoon, in which she remained three or four days.
Her husband thought her dead and sent for the undertaker. He prepared the supposed corpse for interment, without discovering that life still lingered.

HIGH HANDED OUTRAGE.
Negro Entered Young Lady's Room and Chloroformed Her.
Miss Evelyn Cauble, aged 14, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David Cauble, who reside on George Vanderbilt's Baltimore estate, near Asheville, N. C., was Thursday night chloroformed at her home and an attempted assault was frustrated by the screams of her ten year old sister, who occupied the same room. The cries of the younger girl aroused the girl's parents, who put the intruder to flight.
The Asheville police were immediately informed, and Deputy Sheriffs Williams and Penland went to Baltimore with bloodhounds. Baltimore village and the surrounding country have been searched by a posse but up to the present writing no trace of the perpetrator of the crime had been found.
Miss Cauble was several hours regaining consciousness, and she was at first believed to be dying. It was found that entrance to the Cauble residence had been affected through a rear window.

SHIP IN FLAMES.
Fighting Fire in Mid Ocean During a Violent Storm.
The Australian steamer Giulla, which arrived in New York on Friday from Trieste with 763 passengers, had a narrow escape from destruction by fire in mid-ocean, during a violent storm on October 3rd.
The crew fought the flames all day before they were extinguished, while the panic-stricken passengers prayed for help.
The Giulla left Trieste September 14th, calling at Patras and Almeria. After passing Gibraltar, September 25th, the steamer encountered stormy weather with heavy seas.
At daylight on the morning of October 3rd while about 700 miles west of the Azore Islands, one of the crew discovered fire in the cargo at the bottom of No. 2 hold. The wind was blowing violently from the southwest and the Giulla was laboring heavily.
Captain Cherubini ordered part of the cargo broken out and water was turned into the hold, but the fire stubbornly resisted the efforts of the crews.
In the meantime the passengers, of whom there were 27 in the cabin and 736 in the steerage, learned of the danger. Many of them fell on their knees in prayer while others became hysterical, adding to the cares of the harrassed officers and crew when every effort was necessary to save the ship and her big company.
The ships boats were prepared to meet any emergency, but after the hold had been flooded and part of the cargo thrown overboard the fire was extinguished about three o'clock in the afternoon.

VERY MYSTERIOUS AFFAIR
Stranger Shoots Man on Train and Then Leaves.
Andrew Green of 618 Manhattan street, New York city, was the victim of a mysterious shooting in the Wash-bash railroad yards.
He was in the smoker of an east bound passenger train, at Detroit, Mich., on Wednesday night, which was being switched to a ferry when a stranger, apparently about 25 years old, ran through the car and shot the New York man as he slept in his seat.
There were only three other passengers in the car and the man who had done the shooting jumped from the train and escaped before the other passengers could realize what had occurred.
