

WANTED PROTECTION.

Negro From Sidney Mayer's Said His Life Was in Danger—Is in Jail for Protection.

Warren Duncan, colored, from Sidney Mayer's place, in Township No. 6, came to Newberry early Tuesday morning and asked Sheriff Buford to place him in jail in order that his life might be protected. He said that he was at a "wake" Monday night, and the negroes had told him there was a crowd of white men at his home who were going to kill him. Tuesday morning he came to Newberry, and at his request Sheriff Buford placed him in jail.

It will be remembered that the barn and stables, including live stock, wagon, buggy, food, etc., the property of Mr. Sidney Mayer, were burned on Friday night of last week. This fire, which is believed to have been of incendiary origin, was the last in a long list of burnings in that immediate community. The people of the community were naturally very much wrought up over the matter. Whether or not there was any crowd at Warren Duncan's home on Monday night in connection with this matter is not known, but it seems anyway that he got the impression that the white men of the community had connected him with the burning, and that his life was in danger.

Duncan denies emphatically any connection whatever with the burning on last Friday night.

THE SESSIONS COURT.

The November Term for Newberry County Convenes on Monday—Several Important Cases.

The November term of court for Newberry county will convene on Monday, Special Judge H. J. Haynesworth, of Greenville, presiding in the absence of Judge Klugh, who is sick.

The first week will be consumed by the sessions court. There is only one man in jail at present on the charge of murder, Elijah Edwards, charged with the murder of J. Butler Kinard. Henry Werts, charged with the murder of Henry Auton some ten years ago, is under bond, and the case against him may come up for trial. There will be several other important cases which may be tried.

The second week will be consumed by the court of common pleas.

Beginning on Monday, November 16, a special term of court with 12 juries will be held. John W. Ferguson, of Laurens, has been appointed special Judge to preside at this court.

THE SIDEWALK WORK.

The Committee Decides How Far the Work Will be Extended—Will be Completed in a Few Weeks.

The committee from the city council on the work of cementing the sidewalks held a meeting on Tuesday and decided to extend the work from Main street to the lower edge of the Crowell Hotel; from Edw. R. Hipp's store to the opera house corner, and from the lower end of the opera house to the fire headquarters and around the market building.

The contractor hopes to complete the work and turn it over to the city council within the next three weeks.

The work will prove the greatest general improvement that has been placed in the city within the past several years, and is meeting the general approval of the citizens.

Lumber Burned.

Pickpockets got in a good deal of their dirty work in Columbia on Wednesday. Here are two instances as reported by the Columbia State of yesterday:

"Dr. I. M. Hair of Union was relieved of a \$200 diamond stud as he was boarding a street car at the station. Two boys caught him in the act and pointed out the man to Dr. Hair, who left the car and caught the thief and held him until a policeman arrived. At the police station by a shrewd move the culprit threw the diamond in a sewer and flushed it with water. Efforts are being made to recover it. A thorough search will be made today.

"The most affecting scene of yesterday was a very old couple standing off from the crowds at the fair grounds weeping. Every cent they had was gone—not even car fare was left. Their loss was \$65."

PIPE ORGAN RECITAL.

The Description of the Big Pipe Organ. Recital to Be Held Monday Night, November 2nd.

The erection of the pipe organ in the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer during the past week has been an event of great interest to the people of Newberry, and many have visited the church to see the work, which was completed last evening by Mr. Joseph Leisch. All have been received courteously by Mr. Leisch, who is not only one of the best pipe organ experts in the world, but also a most obliging gentleman.

After correspondence with many pipe organ builders and consultations with specialists and organists, the contract was given to M. P. Moller, of Hagerstown, Maryland, and would have been completed by the specified time, September 1st, had not a strike, ordered by the Organ Builder's Association, delayed the work. Mr. Moller's instructions to his workmen were to put their best work on this organ, and no better instrument of its size has ever come from the factory. Mr. Moller is himself a Lutheran, an active member of the Hagerstown church and was a delegate from the Maryland Synod to the General Synod at its last convention.

The organ is in fact two organs, the Swell organ above the Great organ. The Great organ contains the following pipes: 8 foot Open Diapason, metal 61 pipes; 8 foot Dulciana, metal 61 pipes; 8 foot Melodia, wood 61 pipes; 8 foot Doppel Floete, wood 49 pipes; 4 foot Flute D'Amour, wood and metal 61 pipes; 4 Principal, metal 61 pipes; 2 foot Piccolo, metal 61 pipes. The Swell organ contains the following pipes: 8 foot Violin Diapason, metal 61 pipes; 8 foot Stopped Diapason wood 61 pipes; 8 foot Aeolina, metal 61 pipes; 4 foot Flute Traverso, wood 61 pipes; 2 foot Flautino, metal 61 pipes; 8 foot Oboe Gamba, metal 49 pipes. The Pedal organ contains the following pipes: 16 foot Bourdon, wood 30 pipes; 16 foot Lieblich Gedacht, wood 30 notes.

The three organs have together 21 steps, 30 notes and 799 pipes with six pedal movements. It will be run by a water motor of latest and most improved construction, and will consume little more than a barrel of water at a service.

It is almost the invariable custom to instal such an organ with a recital, that all interested may have the opportunity to hear and enjoy the power, scope and beauty of its music. How best to arrange for this was the problem fronting the organ committee. Should the doors be thrown open to the general public? The crowd might be so great that members of the church would be excluded. Should the members of the congregation alone be admitted? That would be selfish. Should the members of the congregation and a selected number of their friends be invited? Some might thus be overlooked. It was finally decided by the committee with the consent of the Church Council and Diaconate to put the admission on a financial basis. No money will be received at the church door, but tickets may be purchased from the organ committee for fifty cents for adults and twenty-five cents for children.

Every member of the congregation will be admitted coming either with or without a ticket, and it is hoped that every member who can possibly be present will attend.

Professor Charles R. Fisher, Mus. D., of the Presbyterian College, Charlotte, N. C. has kindly consented to visit Newberry and give this recital next Monday night.

Dr. Fisher is a musical graduate

of Leeds University and also of other European institutions. He received the title of Doctor of Music from Trinity University, Toronto. This is a title held by very few musicians in America. Of Dr. Fisher's art in bringing out all the possibilities of a pipe organ too much could scarcely be said.

The organ committee is composed of Prof. W. K. Sligh, Chas. E. Summer, Prof. S. L. Powell, Dr. J. M. Kibler, W. P. Houseal, and Rev. W. L. Seabrook.
