Items of More or Less Interest Condensed Throughout the State.

The salary of the mayor of Greenville has been increased from \$900 to \$1,800 a year.

An agitation has begun in this state for the raising of the age limit of the child labor law.

J. J. Hull, mayor of Rock Hill, and editor of the Rock Hill Herald, died Monday night after a long illness.

A movement is on foot to secure an election on voting the dispensary out of Lexington county.

It is rumored that ex-Senator John L. McLaurin will be sent to China to investigate the boycott of American goods.

Mrs. R. E. Ligon, wife of the president of the Gluck cotton mills, got her arm broken by being thrown from her buggy in Anderson Tuesday.

Darlington will have an election on the dispensary question, a requisite number of signers of petitions having been secured.

Every method is being used to keep the yellow fever epidemic, which is infesting a number of seaport towns, out of Charleston.

Former Supervisor Speegle, of Greenville, is still too sick to be arrested and removed from Hendersonville, N. C.

The Citadel academy will have a gymnasium ready for use at the beginning of next session. It will be called the "Gadsden gymnasium."

The City of Columbia, the new steamer of the New York, Columbia and Georgetown ship company, made its initial trip down the Congaree river last Saturday.

J. C. Hemphill, editor of the News and Courier, was tendered a banquet at the Commercial club, Charleston, Monday. Mr. Hemphill sailed the next day for a trip to Europe.

Ed. Martin, alias Ed. Herson, was arrested less than six weeks ago for the murder of Thomas Stone, a crime committed more than 20 years ago, has been released from the jail in Richland county on \$2,000 bond.

Gaffney is to have another artesian well and the boring has already commenced. The work is being done under the supervision of W. B. DuPre, superintendent of the water works and electric light system of that place.

Greenville's board of health has invited the refugees from New Orleans, who are leaving that city on account of yellow fever to stay in Greenville till the disease has been wiped out.

Will Blueshirt, the negro who killed Cora Rice, a negro woman, in Gaffney about a year ago, has been arrested in Knoxville, Tenn., and will be brought to this state to stand trial. There is a reward of \$100 for the negro.

Senator Tillman has accepted an invitation to address a mass meeting of citizens of Edgefield at that place next Saturday. Other prominent political orators will share in the discussion. "The Best Method of Dealing With The Whiskey Evil."

Mrs. Ellen Carnes, aged 24, wife of Robert Carnes of the Manchester mills, was killed by a passenger train on the Southern road, while she was attempting to cross the track in front of the Manchester mills, Tuesday, in Rock Hill.

P. M. Morris, an employee of the Clark Construction company, which is doing a large part of the work in constructing the navy yard at Charleston, has filed suit against the company for \$10,000 damages for the loss of an eye.

GENERAL NEWS NOTES.

Items of More or Less Interest Condensed Throughout the World.

It is reported that the Chinese are weary of the boycott against American goods.

Secretary of State Shaw will sever his connections with the affairs of the Roosevelt administration next February.

Great honor is being shown the party of Secretary Taft in the cities of Japan, where they are visiting.

Austin, Texas, suffered from intense heat Monday night, the mercury ranging from 99 to 105 degrees.

According to the statement of Mrs. Michael Gorman, Frederick E. Carlton tried to get her to kill his wife, who was her own daughter.

Mr. E. U. Kale left Fincastle, West Virginia, July 9th, to attend the Elks convention at Buffalo, N. Y., and has not been heard from since.

The grand circuit races which were to be begun at Cleveland, Ohio, Monday were declared off after the announcement of Mayor Johnson that pool selling would not be permitted.

A lightning flash killed five persons at Coney Island Sunday afternoon. Fifty more were prostrated and nine others were seriously injured.

In a head-on collision between two trolley cars between Wilmington and Wrightsville, N. C., Sunday night, a motorman was killed and about twenty passengers injured.

A French line of steamers between Mobile, Ala., and Havre and Bordeaux, France, will be placed in operation November 1.

The Lanshire cotton operatives, England, have decided to strike on August 19 unless there is an advance made in wages.

The Southern Cotton Growers' association convention, which was to be held in Asheville, N. C., August 16th, has been changed to September.

Eleven prisoners escaped from the Robeson county jail, N. C., Sunday night. The escape was effected by the sawing out of the bars.

E. F. Young, president of the Merchants' and Farmers' bank of Dunn, N. C. has been arrested on the charge of forgery.

A number of telegraph operators in the employ of the Great Northern railroad have struck because they would not accept the wage scale offered by the company.

The plea of the Koreans in connection with the peace settlement between Japan and Russia will not be heard by Japan until after the war is ended.

A serious epidemic of cholera prevails among the famine-stricken people, who have been crowding into the city of Madras, British India. There have been a number of deaths.

J. G. Rawlings, Milton Rawlings and Jesse Rawlings have been sentenced to be hung on the 15th day of September. The parties were charged with the murder of the Carter children.

At an emergency meeting held in London, Monday, the International Cotton congress decided to urge spinners in Europe and America to refrain from buying American cotton for the next three months so as to prevent the danger of the next cotton season beginning with raw material and at the present high prices.

One white boy and two negroes were killed outright and twenty other persons were more or less seriously injured in a heavy wind storm which struck Bessmay, Ia., Tuesday afternoon. Much damage was done to the town.

A broken axle caused the wreck of the California special of the Atchafalpa railroad near Lemont, Ill., sending the train into the ditch. Several persons were killed and others were seriously injured.

The Italian colony which was engaged in unloading banana steamers from Central America at New Orleans, are not allowed to work and are suffering, as one result of the outbreak of yellow fever at that place. The banana ships are being sent to Mobile where the quarantine regulations are less strict.

John T. Graves, an employer of the Southern Express company, who claimed that he was gagged and tied the morning of the 29th, when the supposed robbery of the safe, which contained about \$2,000, happened, has confessed to have committed the crime himself and has given up the money. He is now in jail awaiting trial in Florida.
