**FLOOD CRISIS PASSED IN COWLITZ RIVER RISE.**

No Loss of Life but Much Live Stock. People Camping Out in the Hills.

Portland, Ore., Nov. 16.—Reports from the Cowlitz river region tonight indicate that the crisis of the flood situation has passed. The waters, which swept the river clean of all shingle and lumber property, inundated the surrounding territory and flooded the towns of Castle Rock, Kelso, Ostrander and Olegua, driving the people to the hills and high grounds, began to subside at noon.

While destruction to property was great on both sides of the river no loss of life has been reported. Much live stock, however, was lost. Many persons are still camping in the hills tonight, although most of the refugees have been able to reach the homes of friends on high ground.

A drizzling rain fell today and unless these people can get to places of shelter soon there will be great suffering.

Steamers have gone up the Cowlitz river to gather up the homeless and transfer them to places of safety and shelter.

A relief train on the Northern Pacific left Kalama this afternoon to work its way as far into the flooded region as possible.

The flood water has swept Cowlitz river clean, it is said, not a log or bolt of shingles being left. The loss to Isamoutouto OETA SHRONINUN the lumber and shingle mills, will amount to many thousands of dollars.

The flood in Castle Rock washed away two or three houses but did less damage than was first reported. North Wakama, Wash., reports that damage to the extent of \$200,000 was done by the flood.

**Destruction in Seattle.**

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 16.—A heavy rainfall Wednesday, 2.48 inches in four hours, and a Chinook wind which melted recent fresh snows in the Cascade mountains, coming simultaneously, are the causes of the most disastrous flood in the history of the Puget Sound region. The valleys of the White, Duwamish, Cedar, Green, Stuck, Black and Puyallup rivers are under water, flooding 200 square miles of territory. All traffic over the Northern Pacific and Tacoma-Seattle interurban lines is at a standstill.

Six persons have been drowned. The greatest loss by the streams to the north has been done to the lumbering interests, where millions of feet of logs and shingles bolts have been carried into the sound and out to sea. Hundreds of farm houses and villages are submerged in the second stories and many persons are homeless. The loss to the Northern Pacific alone will reach \$150,000, and the total loss in the district will run to half a million.

**GOVERNOR D. C. HEYWARD ISSUES PROCLAMATION.**

Columbia, S. C., Nov. 17.—Governor Heyward on Saturday issued his Thanksgiving proclamation as follows:

In accordance with a wise and time-honored custom, we as a people have annually set aside one day as a day of Thanksgiving and prayer. This custom has a deep and primal meaning, a meaning which should ever abide in the hearts of those who observe this day.

Now therefore, in full accordance with this custom and by virtue of legal enactment also, I, D. C. Heyward, governor of South Carolina, do hereby set apart.

Thursday, November 29th, as a day of Thanksgiving and prayer.

And I recommend to all the people of this state on that day to assemble themselves in their places of worship, and in happy and grateful communion around the hearthstones of home, also to give thanks to Almighty God for the blessings which His providence and His tender mercies have vouchsafed unto us as a people.

Let the hope be indulged that this day will be hallowed by that love which should fill grateful hearts and that from homes and hearts may radiate the charity which alike graciously blesses those who give even as it does those who receive.

Given under my hand and the great seal of the state at Columbia, our capital, this seventeenth day of November, in the years of our Lord one Thousand Nine Hundred and Six, and of the independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and thirty-first year.

**AN ORDINANCE.**

Fixing the Rate and prescribing the Time for the Payment of Town Taxes for the fiscal year 1906.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and the Aldermen of the Town of Newberry, S. C., in council assembled and by authority of the same:

That for the purpose of raising a revenue and in the exercise of the taxing power of said Town, the following taxes are hereby levied for the fiscal year ending December 31st, 1906, upon all real and personal property within the corporate limits of said Town (except such as is exempt from taxation under the Constitution and laws of this state) upon the valuation thereof as assessed for taxation for the county and state purposes viz:

Section I. That a tax of Sixty cents on each one hundred dollars worth of real and personal property within the corporate limits of the Town of Newberry, in the State of South Carolina (Except such as is exempt from taxation under the constitution and laws of this State) is hereby levied for the purpose of raising a revenue to defray the ordinary expense of said Town for the fiscal year ending December 31st, 1906.

Section II. That a tax of three-fourths of a mill on each dollar's worth of real and personal property within the corporate limits of the Town of Newberry (except such as is exempt from taxation under the Constitution and laws of this state) is hereby levied for the purpose of raising a revenue to defray the bonded indebtedness of said Town for the Opera House.

Section III. That a tax of two and a half mills on each dollar's worth of

real and personal property within the corporate limits of the Town of Newberry (except such as is exempt from taxation under the Constitution and laws of this state) is hereby levied for the purpose of raising a revenue to pay the interest on and create a sinking fund for the bonded indebtedness of said Town for the water works and electric lights plant.

Section IV. That a tax of one mill on each dollar's worth of real and personal property within the corporate limits of the Town of Newberry (except such as is exempt from taxation under the constitution and laws of this state) is hereby levied for the purpose of raising a revenue to pay the interest on the bonded indebtedness of said Town for the sewerage system.

Section V. That all taxes herein imposed or levied shall be paid to the said Town in lawful money of the United States, between the fifteenth day of October, 1906, and fifteenth day of November, 1906, and a penalty of ten per cent is hereby imposed upon, and shall be added to, all taxes in arrears.

Section VI. That the execution issue according to law for the collection of all taxes fines or penalties past due and unpaid for fifteen days, and cost of said execution.

Done and ratified under the corporate seal of the Town of Newberry, in the State of South Carolina, this third day of October A. D. 1906.
