## COUNTY FARMERS' UNION.

## Met Last Saturday—Adopts Strong Resolutions Against "Night Riders"—Officers Elected.

The regular quarterly meeting of the County Farmers' Union was held last Saturday with a good representation of the membership present.

The following resolutions were heartily and unanimously adopted: Whereas, we learn from the press reports within the last few weeks from different sections of the cotton belt that lawless bands calling themselves "Night Riders" are posting gimories demanding that no more cotton be ginned,

Resolved, That as members of the Farmers' Union and as law abiding citizens we do deprecate and condemn any and all threats and acts of lawlessness of any and every nature whatsoever, as we deem any interference with the property, rights and liberties of any person or persons as repugnant to the principles and teachings of our great order.

Resolved further, That we will do all in our power to assist all officers charged with the maintenance of law and order to apprehend and bring to punishment any "Night Riders," or any other lawless marauders masquerading under the guise of our order.

This action by the meeting was strongly approved by representatives from every section of the county as we wish to put on public record our strongest disapproval of all such lawlessness.

## SERIOUS FIRE AVERTED.

## Linen Room Newberry Hotel Catches Fire From Electric Iron—Discovered in Time.

What came near being a very serious fire on Sunday night was averted by the watchfulness of the Newberry police.

About eleven o'clock, Chief J. C. Adams, and Policemen H. H. Franklin, and E. N. Austin met on the corner of the public square near the drug store of Gilder and Weeks and they saw a very bright light reflected on the building across the street from the Newberry hotel. Upon investigation it was found that the quilts and blankets in the linen room of the hotel were on fire.

Mrs. Brockman uses an electric iron on occasions and had it in the linen room. Her rule is to disconnect the wire when the iron is not in use but on Saturday it seems to have been overlooked. Sunday night about nine or ten o'clock one of the guests desired additional cover and the boy who went to this room to get it turned on the light and failed to turn it off when he came from the room. This also turned the current on the electric iron which was on the board on the pile of comforts. The police officers together with Mr. Brockman and one of the boys at the hotel extinguished the fire without giving any alarm, and as a result very few people know of the fire and none of the guests at the hotel were disturbed.
