INCORPORATORS MEET.

Augusta and Edgefield Railroad—
Shall It Come Via Saluda to Newberry?

This is a question the people of Newberry must answer. It is certain this road will be built. It is probable that it will be built very soon.

A meeting of the incorporators was held at Edgefield last Wednesday to consider proposals to make a survey and cost of building. A number of bids were submitted. Another meeting will be held on Friday of this week to let the contract.

The following notice of the meeting will appear in the Edgefield News on Wednesday and we are permitted to print it:

The meeting of the incorporators of the Augusta & Edgefield Electric Railroad Company here last week was well attended, and much was accomplished toward the survey of the road.

The only business before the board was the report of the committee consisting of Messrs. Wm. P. Calhoun, chairman, W. A. Strom and S. B. Mays on selecting a surveyor to survey and locate the line. Over thirty bids were made for the survey ranging in price from fifteen hundred to eleven thousand dollars. The work connected with this matter was heavy and tedious, requiring much correspondence, covering a number of weeks.

The incorporators present were: Mr. E. H. Aull, of Newberry, and Messrs. S. T. Williams and W. A. Strom, of Pleasant Lane; B. E. Nicholson, John Sheppard, A. E. Padgett and Wm. P. Calhoun of Edgefield.

The report of the committee was made by Mr. Wm. P. Calhoun. It required much time to read, and discuss the bids. Besides, Messrs. R. W. Requaith of Charleston, S. C.; W. R. Allen, of Philadelphia, Pa., and Lilley, of Columbia, S. C., civil engineers made statements to the board, explaining the bids made by them.

From so large a number of bids made in various forms, it was a difficult matter to decide which to accept, especially as the board desired to make no mistake in selecting a surveyor. After sifting down the bids considerably, on motion of Mr. John C. Sheppard, Messrs. Wm. P. Calhoun, W. A. Strom and B. E. Nicholson were elected by the board to go over the remaining bids, make a selection and report to an adjourned meeting the result of their work. The committee has carried out its instructions and will report to the board at a meeting to be held on Friday, October 10th, when final action will be taken in the matter and arrangements made to have the road surveyed.

The meeting was a most harmonious one. Every one present seemed determined to do his full duty.

Mr. E. H. Aull stated that the

Newberry people desired to have a hand in this road. He made a business talk on the line of building a road from Edgefield via Saluda to Newberry. He gave some interesting information. On his return home, Mr. Aull stated that he would take the matter up with his people and the chamber of commerce of Newberry and would make a definite report at the meeting of the incorporators on October 9th.

The matter of the survey will be pushed vigorously and surveyors put in the field just as soon as possible.
