

APPROPRIATION BILL CARRIES \$1,777,325

RECOMMENDATIONS OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

Asylum, Citadel, Election, and Colored College Responsible for Increase Recommended.

Columbia, Feb. 7.—The annual appropriation bill, to meet the ordinary expenses of the State government for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 1910, and such other expenses as may be incurred by the present general assembly, as reported by the ways and means committee of the house of representatives, carries an appropriation of \$1,777,325.44, as against a total of \$1,632,439.19 carried by the appropriation bill passed by the legislature last session, or an increase of \$144,913.65.

For the State Hospital for the Insane \$70,000 additional is appropriated, upon the urgent recommendation of the legislative investigating committee, the majority of the committee wanting to make the increase larger. This increase is for additional maintenance and equipment. On account of the fact that this is election year, an increase of \$31,500 was necessary for election purposes.

For the Citadel \$35,000 additional was recommended to build another story for additional dormitories, and \$14,000 for the State colored college by reason of the recent destruction by fire of its dormitory. These items of increase total \$150,500, and had the committee seen its way clear to exclude them from their recommendations the bill would really have carried less.

The appropriation for the governor's office is fixed at \$16,500, there being an increase of \$2,500 over last year (in the amount provided "for enforcement of the law," this amount being fixed at \$5,000 this year. There is no change in the appropriation for the secretary of state's office and the comptroller general's office, the appropriation for the former being fixed at \$6,700 and for the latter at \$11,550. For the insurance commissioner's office the amount fixed is \$8,400, an increase of \$1,000 over last year.

There are some minor changes in the appropriations for the other State offices, but there is no material increase or decrease. For the department of agriculture, commerce and immigration an increase of about \$3,000 is recommended, the appropriation being fixed at \$15,000.

The appropriation recommended for the University of South Carolina is \$96,883, an increase of about \$12,000.

The appropriation for Winthrop is about \$11,000 less than last year.

The whole appropriation recommended for the Citadel, including the increase named, is \$65,000, and \$31,900 is recommended for the Institute for the Deaf, Dumb and Blind, an increase of about \$2,000 over last year. The total recommendation for the State colored college is \$24,284.44. For other educational purposes the appropriation is \$88,039.65.

For the State Hospital for the Insane \$200,000 is recommended for maintenance, \$3,000 for salary of superintendent, \$1,200 for board of regents, \$50,000 for improvements and repairs, and \$671.01 for the additional amount due the investigating committee, making a total of \$254,817.01.

For the South Carolina Industrial school the recommendation is \$7,500, an increase of about \$3,500 over last year. For the penitentiary the appropriation is the same—\$6,550. The recommendation of \$262,000 for pensions is the same as was appropriated last year. The item for interest on bonded debt is also the same—\$295,586.22. For elections the amount named is \$39,660. The miscellaneous item is about \$68,000 and the necessary appropriations are of course recommended for the expenses of the general assembly.

The levy will of course not be fixed until the bill has been considered and acted upon by the general assembly.

PLAN CORN EXPOSITION.

Movement Launched at Columbia.—Alex. D. Hudson President.

Columbia, February 3.—At a conference held today it was decided to begin active steps toward holding a corn exposition here next December. The plan is to enlist the cooperation of all chambers of commerce and

boards of trade and individuals in the State. It is hoped that \$5,000 may be raised for prizes. Active steps were also taken to sub-divide the work among the committee. President Alex. Hudson stated that he is very much gratified at the enthusiastic support given the movement. In accordance with the resolution passed at the recent meeting the committee appeared before the ways and means committee of the house and secured a favorable report on a \$1,000 appropriation to be put into the bill.

The money is to be expended under the direction of the president and the commissioner of agriculture, commerce and industries, and the work is to be done under direction of these and the head of the agricultural department at Clemson college and the superintendent of extension work. Other meetings will be held later on.


