We think the governor was a little impetuous in his first letter to Mr. Rhame and that it would have been better to have given Mr. Rhame an opportunity to have stated his position without threatening his removal.

It has been suggested from some source that the State convention should do away with the county to county campaign by the candidates for State offices. The convention should not agree to any such proposition. That is part of the primary system and let the procession proceed and enlighten the voters and discuss the issue or the issues if there are any issues to be discussed. Give every candidate a square deal and the voter an opportunity to see and hear those who are asking his vote.

If the local postmaster is required to discontinue rural mail on any routes where the roads are neglected by the patrons, either Rural Carrier W. G. Peterson or Postmaster Purcell has been derelict in his duty. We went out over a portion of Mr. Peterson's route the other day. We have been traveling this road for many years, but we never saw it in the condition it is now. It is almost impassable at this time and we wondered how Mr. Peterson made his daily rounds on it and wondered some more why the people permitted it to remain as it is when they have constant occasion to use it themselves. We know the weather has been bad, but a little dragging after each rain, and a little more dragging, would have put it in much better condition. As it is now it will be a bad road all the year. How the farmers are to haul their fertilizer we do not see.

Newberry's Share of Fireman's Funds.
Insurance Commissioner McMaster has turned over to the State Treasurer for distribution to 37 towns the 1 per cent. department fund collected from fire insurance companies doing business in Newberry county and towns. The total amount turned over to the State treasurer is \$11,782.57. The State treasurer will make distribution to the city clerks of the towns. Newberry gets \$241.22.

Highly Important.

The following from the Rural Home and Carrier's Messenger should be read and heeded by those directly interested and for whose benefit it is made:

"The fourth assistant postmaster general has issued an order permitting local postmasters to suspend rural free mail delivery 30 days when the carrier reports habitual neglect of roads by any patron, overseer or trustee. If the road is not made good within 30 days the local postmaster is requested to recommend that the badly kept portion be permanently withdrawn from the route."

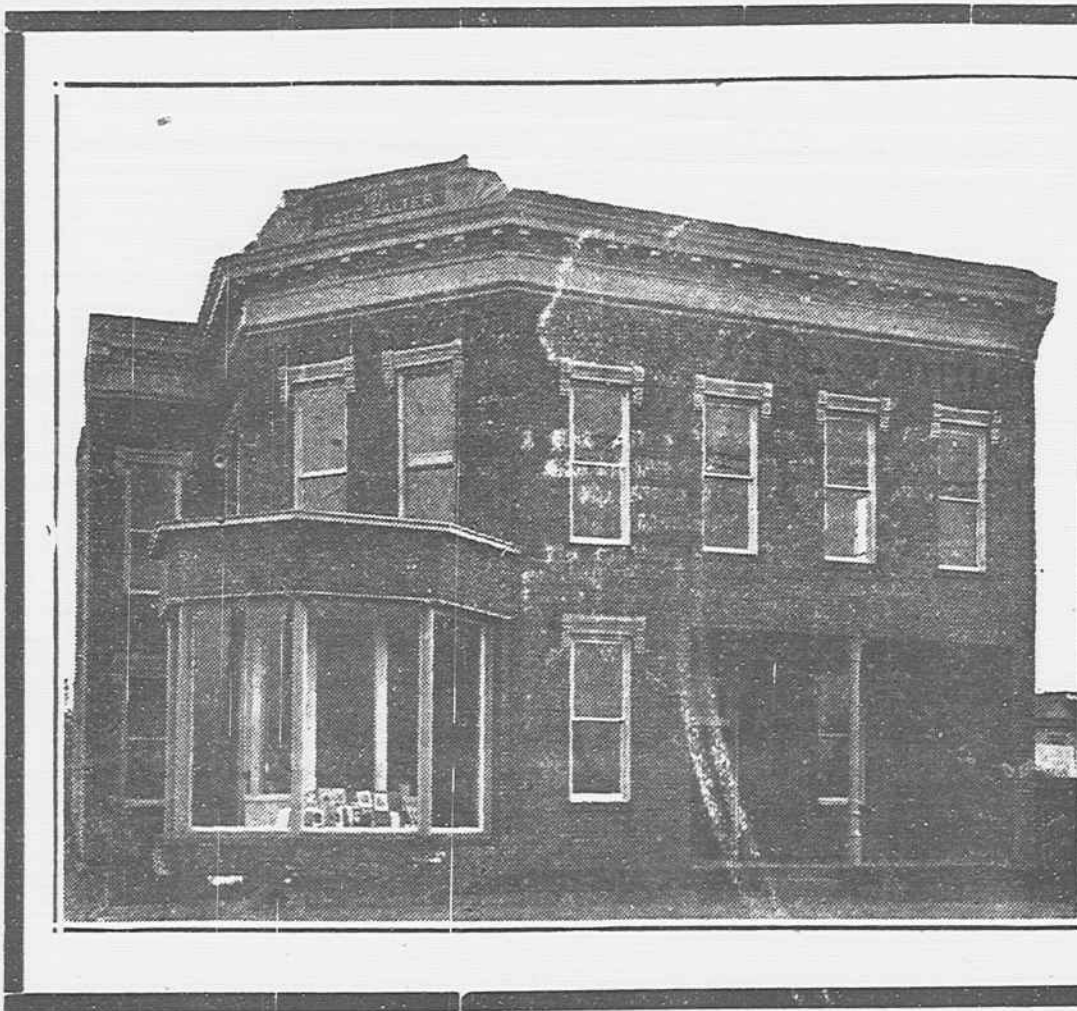

Enforcement of Liquor Law.

Editor The Herald and News: We see that Sheriff Buford is being highly commended on his appointment of rural police and we are glad indeed that the sheriff has pleased the people in this matter. We were afraid that some one might not like it. Since these appointments are so very pleasing, we suppose that the tax-payers will not object to paying about eighteen hundred dollars a year to keep them up.

Now, we understand that one of the main duties of these policemen is to stop the illicit sale of whiskey. We certainly hope that they and the sheriff will do something to that end. Heretofore, although the sheriff had the power to make arrests of whiskey sellers and to seize contraband liquor, and had the power to appoint as many deputies as he wished for these purposes, we have had to look to the governor to give us a constable for this kind of work. Now that the governor is not allowed under any circumstances to appoint constables, the whole matter of law enforcement is in the hands of the sheriff. We know that Sheriff Buford will do his duty. He has never failed. We see often in the papers how well he has performed his duties, and we know him to be a detective of high order. He can sit in his office and locate the blind tigers and then his rural policemen can raid and arrest them. So the people must not blame the governor if any whiskey is sold. The governor has nothing to do with that matter in Newberry county. L. A. T.
