We are now in the midst of school closings and commencements. For all of the young people who are finishing and those who are just getting started The Herald and News extends its very best wishes that all of their dreams may be realized and they may add much to the advancement of the world and the betterment of the human race.

Every honest Democrat is in favor of an honest primary—in favor of white Democrats having the right to vote once, and only once, and to have the votes counted fairly and the result declared honestly. The trouble with the so-called primary "reformers" is that a good many of them seem to think that the only way to protect white Democrats in their right to participate in a Democratic primary is to take away from some of them that right.

The State convention will meet in Columbia on Wednesday. The newspapers and various others have been discussing the probable action of the convention on the matter of so-called "primary reform," and expressing their views as to what should be done. The convention will be largely dominated, it appears, by opponents of the present governor, and there will be no lack of an effort to play politics. What will be done remains to be seen. The people will be heard from in the August primary.

A great deal is being written and printed by various and sundry persons about reforming the primary. The State convention will wrestle with the proposition this week. As a matter of fact we do not see much necessity for reforming so far as rules and regulations and laws go. There is plenty of law now to punish illegal voting and fraud if the law were enforced. It is against the rules to vote twice or more times. It is against the rules to vote unless your name is enrolled on the club lists a certain number of days before the election. It is against the rules unless you have been a resident of the State and county a certain number of months. Punishment for violation of any or all of these rules is provided by the statute law of the State. What more can you do towards reforming, unless you call it reforming the primary to require every one applying to vote to be registered and to have his tax receipt. It seems to us that what you need is enforcement of present law rather than the making of more law. Another thing, you can not make people honest and truthful by laws and rules and regulations. In our view you need reforming of the voter, if you need anything, rather than reforming of the rules. Really what is needed is more rigid observance and enforcement of existing rules and regulations rather than the making of more rules simply to have them treated as if they did not exist. To the making of laws is like the writing of books, there is no end.

**"THE STATE" AND "THE RECORD."**

On April 23 the editor of the Columbia Record was arrested on two warrants sworn out by Mr. W. Frank Blackburn, stenographer in the governor's office, charging the editor of the Columbia Record with wilfully and maliciously, and with malicious intent, originating, uttering, circulating and publishing false statements concerning Governor Blease. The editor of the Columbia Record was released on a bond of \$5,000 for his appearance in the circuit court for Richland county, and one of his two bondsmen was Mr. W. W. Ball, managing editor of the Columbia State. In the Columbia State of May 13 there was an article in which was given an account of a suit for \$50,000 instituted by the Columbia State against the Columbia Record. The Columbia Record, it appears

from the pleadings in the suit instituted by the Columbia State, had charged the Columbia State with "misrepresentation" in the matter of the circulation of the Columbia State. Paragraph 7 of the complaint of the Columbia State reads: "That the said publication in defendant's newspaper (the Record) was malicious and false and was calculated and tended to impeach and injure the honesty, integrity and reputation of plaintiff (the Columbia State) and to hold up and expose it to public hatred, contempt, ridicule and obloquy, and to injure it in its business and occupation," etc.

Without reference to the merits of either case, it is illuminating to note the fact that the managing editor of the Columbia State is one of the two bondsmen for the defendant in the criminal proceeding instituted against the editor of the Record, and that the Columbia State is the plaintiff in the civil suit instituted against the Record.

**Safe Crackers at Seneca Leave No Clues.**

Anderson, May 16.—A telegram from Seneca tonight says that the railroad detectives and police department have found absolutely no trace of the yeggmen who cracked the safe of the express company early yesterday morning. The officials have made no statement as to the amount of loot obtained, but reliable information is that something less than \$1,000 is missing. It is known that a package containing several hundred dollars was in the safe when robbed. Four or five railroad detectives are in Seneca investigating and this is taken to mean that a large amount of money was secured by the robbers.
