It has been decided to build a top story on the building at a cost of about \$1,000, that will be used for the higher classes and also as an auditorium.

We have had nice rains for the past few weeks which is causing the crops to show much more prosperous than it seemed once they could possibly have done, while our cotton is very late in most places it is clear of grass and is in fine growing condition.
