A Child Fatally Burned.

Evangeline, the little six-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P. R. Hallman, of Oakland, was fatally burned on midday Tuesday and died at midnight of the same date, being buried at Rosemont cemetery on Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, service by Rev. W. A. Leighton.

The distressing accident occurred in the yard of a near neighbor, while the little girl was standing close to the fire under the wash pot, when her dress caught fire the child ran under a house and those who saw her could do nothing else than throw buckets of water on her to extinguish the flames. The services of three physicians were powerless to save her from the shock of the cold water and the burns from the flames, her back being burned.

The bereaved parents will have the full sympathy of the community in the agonizing death of their little girl.
