In their ears across the span of a century, and they were marching with Lee and Jackson, and as Currell told them in plain and simple language of the greatness of the matchless leader, they became again, and in their dream they were more on the battle field and the roar of cannon and the drums came back to them from the years. And in their dreams

of torture, how many such! weeks of the stick and crutch! all the glint of the steel blue eye of a spirit that wouldn't die."

The Herald and News trusts that the time may never come when these memorial occasions will not be one of the events in the annals of this county. There were several veterans here from Lexington and some from Laurens, and they are always welcome. The old Third regiment, in which there were four companies from Newberry and four from Laurens and one from Spartanburg and one from Union, and many men from Lexington, makes the old boys feel that county lines can not divide any more now than they did fifty years ago. The last bearer of the old Third regiment flag was William Lamb, of Company G, of Laurens. The tattered and worn flag was brought to Newberry by Comrade T. J. Duckett, and as it was displayed on the stage at the opera house, no doubt brought more stirring memories than any other one thing to the old vets. It was carried by the regiment from Manassas to Appamatov. There are only two survivors of the regiment who at any time carried the flag while the regiment was in action, and they are W. G. Peterson and E. P. Bradley, of Newberry.

The exercises at the opera house were interesting and impressive. The opera house was comfortably filled. The school children marched down in a body and occupied seats in the gallery. The monument had been decorated, as had the graves at the cemeteries. The rain on Tuesday kept a good many away, though some were here who had not only passed the three score and ten, but who had gone more than four score and ten. Mr. Jacob Shealy, of Little Mountain, never misses a reunion, and he is now 96 years old. He and three sons served in the war and he is younger in spirit and action than many men many years his junior in years.

Major J. F. J. Caldwell was master of ceremonies. Prayer was offered by Dr. Harms. A beautiful and inspiring address of welcome was eloquently delivered by Miss Catherine Harms. Mr. John M. Kinard read the tributes to Capt. Gary and to the dead since the last Memorial day. The silent roll was called by Adjutant Buford. Excellent music was furnished by a select choir. The solo, "The Boys in Gray Are Growing Old," by Miss Carolyn Caldwell, was exceptionally sweet and appropriate.

Dr. W. S. Currell, president of the South Carolina university, delivered the oration. He spoke of the prominent traits in the life of Robert E. Lee, and for nearly an hour held the undivided attention of the large audience. It was a beautiful tribute to the life of the great American.

Injustice to Railroads.

Leslie's. Unfair! The glaring injustice of the government's treatment of the railroads in the matter of carrying the mails is brought out in a comparison of what Uncle Sam pays his own road and what he pays others. The government owned Panama railroad received last year, according to a statement by the committee on railway mail pay, \$2.77 for each ton of mail carried a mile, while the private roads in the United States, according to estimates of the postoffice department, received about 10 cents per ton for each mile. If this is the kind of extravagance the government ownership of railroads stands for, it will be a long while before the voters of this country will give it serious consideration. Had the privately owned railroads of the United States been paid on the same basis as the Panama railroad, instead of receiving \$56,000,000, or about one-fifth of the postoffice department's revenues, they would have received \$1,557,000,000, or more than five times the total revenues of the department. The railroads have not asked congress to advance mail pay rates. All they have asked for is to be paid for all the mail they carry and for all the special facilities and services they furnish the postoffice department. Why not, Uncle Sam?
