That may be true and no doubt such a book would be a valuable contribution to the history of the State. But as a matter of hard experience we would not advise any one to write a history of Greenville or any other county expecting it to be anything but a labor of love and without compensation of any other kind. The people may tell you how much they want a history of the county and what they will give to have such a book but when the book is printed they will decide to wait awhile and in the meantime the author and the publisher are out of their money. We know from experience. The public does not appreciate at least in a substantial manner any such patriotic service. Maybe if you would print only a limited number of copies and put half of them away for twenty five years then you might sell them at a fair price.

We do not consider that our contract with our subscribers calls upon us to tell them what they want to know, or what we would like them to know. According to the way we figure it, it is up to us to do the best we can in the way of telling them what is happening.—Yorkville Enquirer.

We hope the boys will have a fine meeting.
