THOUSANDS SEE PRISONER BURN

Taken From Court Room After Conviction and Incarcerated in the Public Square.

Waco Texas, May 15.—With 15,000 persons as witnesses, including women and children, Jesse Washington, negro boy, who confessed to the assault and murder of a white woman, seven miles south of here, last Monday, was taken from the Fifth district court room shortly before noon and burned on the public square.

The burning came immediately after the negro's trial had ended and the jury had returned a verdict of guilty, giving him the death penalty. Some one not far from the negro started the cry of "Get the negro." It was taken up by all those from the part of the county where the negro's victim was killed and Washington was then seized and removed from the court room. The crowd at first seemed willing to hang the negro from the suspension bridge, but a suggestion that he be burned on the plaza met with instant response and he was dragged to the city hall yard, where the chain, already around his neck, was thrown over the limb of a tree, wood was hastily secured and the fire was started.

After the verdict had been returned, Washington said in half audible whisper: "I'm sorry I done it." The rush to get the negro was so sudden that officers, lawyers, and newspaper men were swept off their feet and the victim was in the hands of the mob before any one could stop the proceedings.

While the crowd that took Washington from the court room is said to have been composed of people from the country it was joined by many citizens of Waco, and in some instances they left their places of business to view the burning of the negro.

Later in the day members of the mob returned to the scene of the burning, placed the charred body in a sack and dragged it through the streets behind an automobile to Robinson, where the victim was killed. What remained of it was suspended from a telephone pole there.

Whereas, one-third of the resident electors and a like proportion of the resident freeholders of the age of twenty-one years, in Monticello school District No. 17, of the County of Newberry, State of South Carolina, have filed a petition with the County Board of Education of Newberry County, South Carolina, petitioning and requesting that an election be held in said School District on the question of levying a special tax of two (2) mills to be collected on all the taxable property within the said School District.

Now, therefore, we the undersigned, composing the County Board of Education for Newberry County, State of South Carolina, do hereby order the Board of Trustees of the Monticello School District No. 17, to hold an election on the said question of levying a special tax of two (2) mills to be collected on the property located in the said School District, which said election shall be held at the Monticello School House in said School District No. 17, on Friday, the 9th day of June, 1916, at which said election the polls shall be opened at 7 a. m. and closed at 4 p. m.

The members of the Board of Trustees of said School District shall act as managers of said election. Only such electors as reside in said School District and return real of personal property for taxation, and who exhibit their tax receipts and registration certificates as required in general elections, shall be allowed to vote. Electors favoring the levy of such tax shall cast a ballot containing the word "Yes" written or printed thereon, and each elector opposed to such levy shall cast a ballot containing the word "No" written or printed thereon.

When the president asked Mr. Wescott to make the speech he did not know that the New Jersey delegates had asked Gov. Fielder. In view of the president's wish to have Mr. Wescott, it is said, the governor will withdraw.

Close advisers of the president have begun mapping out the platform to be presented to the convention. Peace and prosperity are understood to have been settled upon as being among the principal issues.

Easily Wins Reelection in Primary—Five Members of Council Hold On.

Anderson, May 16.—In the primary election held here today J. H. Godfrey was elected mayor over Wade H. Sanders, former city engineer, by 381 votes. The votes were: Godfrey 801, Sanders 420. Five members of the present city council were reelected, as follows: Walter Dobbins, Charles F. Spearman, J. H. Tate, R. R. King and R. L. Carter. Alderman Barton from Ward 1 did not offer for reelection, and Dr. W. E. Atkinson succeeds him, defeating C. W. McGee. The vote for mayor and aldermen today is a strong indorsement of the present administration, which has spent something over \$300,000 for street improvement.
