that farm horses fed on farm raised oats, could do more work, and keep in better condition at a cost of \$40 per annum, than they could, if fed on corn, and fodder at a cost of \$85 per annum. We have never had any experience in the cultivation of tobacco, but have realized a large profit to the area, on sugar cane, and produced more pork with chufas, than anything we have ever tried. We will venture to say that one acre planted in chufas will grow more hog, than three in corn, with some manure. Banking in the bunch till spring is the best way to preserve the seed.

A large percentage of our colored citizens who obtained supplies from Manning, claim to have found cotton lighter, goods much cheaper, whiskey more palatable, and even the roads much lighter, and distance nearer to Sumner this fall, than last spring and summer.

Please allow us to express, through your columns, the most heartfelt sympathy for the members of Calvary Church, at the continued ill health of their much loved, and venerable old pastor, Rev. H. W. Mahoney, who has filled their pulpit, ably and acceptably, to them for a consecutive term of 56 years. Calvary is now without a pastor in consequence thereof.


