



R. Brooke, commanding the depart-R. Brooke, commanding the depart-feeling after eating, giving you new ment of the east, in his annual report life and vigor. The R. B. Loryea Drug for the fiscal year, records the fact that Store. since his last previous report he has visited and inspected, with a few exceptions, all the posts in that department.
