

That New Jersey judge who recently decided that it is no crime to swipe an umbrella during a rain storm evidently belongs to the borrowing class. He feels no sympathy for the man who loses his umbrella just when he needs it most.

Charleston is now undergoing a "white crusade" for the purpose of driving out lawlessness, perhaps there is good reason to believe there is violation of law in that city. When Johnny Grace gets to be Mayor he will institute a crusade that will wipe out lawlessness in Charleston, and make of that city a second paradise. Grace is a live wire and when he assumes charge of municipal affairs there will be something doing besides hot air blasts of purity.

Governor Ansel has commuted the sentence of Pink Franklin charged with the killing of H. E. Valentine a constable in Orangeburg county to life imprisonment. This is a peculiar case. Valentine went to Franklin's house to serve a warrant and was killed, the case was taken to the United States supreme court and the verdict of the State court sustained. It seems to us that Franklin was either guilty of murder and the death penalty should be enforced or he is innocent and should be free.

If the assembled wisdom of the South Carolina Legislature will go to work and evolve a department for the equitable assessment of property on as sound business basis as the insurance department under Commissioner McMaster it will deserve the thanks and commendation of all good people, but what a kick

there would be from the mountains to the jumping off place! The trouble is that the weight of influence in this State doesn't want fair and equitable assessment of property for taxation and it doesn't mind false swearing to have its way.

Nearly all the men in one Ohio county have recently been fined and disfranchised for a term of years upon conviction for having sold their votes in the late election. Some of our older readers will remember that the great State of Ohio furnished some of the leading carpetbag scamps who came down to South Carolina forty-odd years ago and debauched the ignorant negroes, teaching them how to sell votes, take bribes and engage in all kinds of political rascality during the days of good stealing. Our first Republican governor was R. K. Scott, a carpetbagger from Ohio. No doubt those poor devils recently convicted up there came by their rascality honestly.

#### \$100 Reward, \$100.

The readers of this paper will be pleased to learn that there has been one decided case that settles the law as to the right of a man to sue for the loss of his property. A man named C. H. H. was recently convicted of stealing a horse and the court ruled that the owner could sue for the value of the horse and the cost of the search for it. This is a very important case and one that every man should know.

#### Negro and White Man.

Last January Anthony Burgess, an old colored man, killed his son-in-law down in Clarendon county, South Carolina, because he had treated his wife, the old man's daughter, so cruelly that she died. He fled the county and found refuge in New York city, where he was apprehended last week and held by the police for requisition by the South Carolina authorities. Last Thursday he was delivered to the sheriff of Clarendon county, who was accompanied by L. R. McIntosh. When the old negro saw McIntosh, he was asked whether or not he was willing to go with the South Carolina officers, and said: "I'll go if I know that man, and I know him when he was a baby and I know his father's name. They're gentlemen, and I won't put no gentleman to bother on my account."

"If I'm anything they want me to do, I've done enough trouble for 'em. I run away cos I was afraid of what the niggers down there might do to me. I wasn't afraid of the whites, cos they're gentlemen. I'll go back, and if they clear me, all right, and if they don't, I'll clear the old niggers."

And McIntosh slipped his arm through that of Anthony and said: "Come along, uncle!" To a reporter he said: "My father's last dollar will be spent, if need be, to clear the old niggers."

This is the simple story told by the World, and it was worth telling, because it illustrated in a striking way the relations between the whites and blacks in the South; we mean the real whites and blacks, the whites and blacks that are to be found nowhere else in the country except in the South. It is not to be expected that the yankees shall

understand the feeling that obtains between the old negroes in the South and their former masters, their deep-seated affection, their mutual good will, their disposition to help each other in all times of sorrow and distress.

Will "Uncle Anthony" be punished for his offense? Not if the money of the McIntoshes can prevent it and there is any law to save him from the penalties of the law. A white man who killed his son-in-law for cruelty to his daughter would not be punished, and Anthony Burgess will doubtless be acquitted. His crime, his flight, his arrest, his surrender, his trial are only incidents in a case which brings out in sharp outline the relations between the races in the South.—Richmond Times-Dispatch.
