Will hold its Second Annual Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition during the week of November 17 to 22, 1913. In many respects this is to be the most unique Fair ever held in this or any other place in the country. Children's Day.

SOUTHEAST SEES VALUE OF LIVE STOCK



Marketing the Famous Blue Grass.

A great variety of grasses and fern crops are raised in the southeastern states. In Kentucky, Virginia and Tennessee, the famous bluegrass; in Alabama, and in fact, all over the southeast, vetch, both winter and hairy vetch. The writer has seen fields of vetch from six to seven feet high, which yielded over three tons per acre.

Japanese clover, crimson clover, millet, cowpeas, soy-beans, all yield well in most sections of the south with the minimum of cultivation and care. The south is really the home of the cowpea. It is to the southern stock grower what the red clover is to the farmers of the north. It grows most luxuriantly in the hot weather, seeds out in about two months, and yields from two to three tons per acre. Used in connection with corn and other grain, cowpeas make as fine pork as can be produced in this country.

On all the lime stone soils of the south red clover yields largely. It is the main standby of the dairyman, and it is easily maintained. Where soils do not take red clover, crimson clover will usually catch well. Soy-beans is another fine crop for the southern stockman and dairyman. It will produce from 10 to 15 tons of silage per acre; and an average of three tons of cured hay on any kind of decent soil is not unusual. It stands waist high in midsummer, and grows very thick. Both the cattle and hogs thrive on this excellent food.

During the past few years the south has shown what it can do in the way of growing corn. Hundreds of localities have reported the yields of over 100 bushels per acre, and under exceptional conditions where cultivation has been carried on under the stimulus of prizes, yields as high as 175 bushels per acre have been reported.

In 1910, 45 per cent. of the total gain in the production of corn for the entire country was made in the southeastern states, pretty good evidence that the corn-belt is being slowly but surely shifted. When it is known that a small proportion of the farmers of the south have taken up the new farming methods, it will be seen that when they learn down there how to do things by the quickest and shortest cut and best methods, the production of corn and all other stock feeds will rise tremendously.

One of the most important productions in the south in the matter of stock-feed is cottonseed meal. The south ships this product all over the north, and immense quantities go abroad. Denmark alone took 265,000 pounds in 1910.

As cottonseed meal is now used largely by dairymen in every state in this country, the advantage to southern farmers of being able to produce this feed on their own land is apparent.

Up to this time the south has sent outside of its own borders much of its meat products. One southern state alone has spent as much as \$40,000,000 in a single year for meat product, all of which was bought from farmers of other states. The tremendous rise of population in the southern states has created a market which the southern farmer had not known of before, and aroused his interest in the production of livestock. He is now beginning to realize tremendous opportunities that lie at his door, outside of the cotton crop, and there is no doubt that stock-raising, will, within the next ten years, become one of the most important industries of that section.


