Fire destroyed the house occupied by Jim Miller, and owned by Mr. E. L. Wilkins last Thursday night about eleven o'clock. The building was situated about thirty feet from the residence of Mr. Wilkins and there were several large barns near, though no other damage was done.

Our people are so shocked and demoralized that I will not wait for any concerted expressions, but will hasten to express in their behalf our gratitude and thanks, to so many of the physicians and nurses and citizens of Summerton, who came to our rescue last night. With wires down and people buried in fallen timber and brick walls and no body knowing how many were killed and injured doubtless the reports which reached Summerton were greatly exaggerated. Up to this time, Saturday afternoon, there are only three killed, Mr. Beasley Davis, Miss. Lara Bagget and a negro porter. It is likely that this will cover the death roll, unless it is Mr. Joe Graham of Foreston. The other seven others injured will likely all recover.

Sumter county is the mother of Clarendon county and Sumter city is Manning's friend. Your good people showed us last night that Sumter hearts are in the right place. We are unable to express how much we appreciate this noble spirit.

More than a hundred automobiles bringing physicians, solicitors, friends, and even a thoughtfully detailed police guard, came from Sumter as quickly as they could run.

Similar action to that of Sumter was taken by Mr. R. J. Adelman, of Alcolu, who offered to close his big lumber mill and send his force of men on his own train to help the people of Manning.

Our people are deeply touched by this and while suffering heavily in loss of buildings and merchandise stocks, and the heavier loss of three lives killed outright, and six or eight badly hurt, we feel a deep sense of appreciation to the friendly offices of the people of Sumter and Alcolu, and a closer bond of sympathy and attachment—Sumter Daily Item.

Col. Brailsford Again.  
Mr. Editor: I saw in The Times of this morning that A. J. Richbourg has an effusion purporting to be a record of his pension board. Records are material truths kept for reference, but my comrade slips up badly when he attempts to justify the paying of pensions to W. W. Brailsford and J. J. Ross on the ground that they belong to the reserved Confederate army, for positively there was no such organization as a reserved Confederate army; only amenable to the orders of the Governor and could not be tried out of the limits of the State without his sanction.

Governor Brown of Georgia, was requested by General Joe Johnson to allow that splendid body of State troops numbering over fifty thousand to operate with his army and enable him to hurl Sherman's horrids back upon Tennessee. Brown refused and Georgia was ravaged. A small onion would contain the tears I shed for her, no Gov. ordered their State troops to their borders and they came in late.

And here is the chairman and one of the pension board of this county paying off State troops without requiring them to sign the form of application that the confederate signs, for if they did, they would have seen readily that they had never been Confederate soldiers, Bradham says there is no Turbeville on the pension list when his name was next to Bradhams in that favored class A, and general order was that they cannot afford as officials, to be lacking in public spirit. Therefore I trust each one can so shape his business that he can attend and give one day of his time for the welfare of the schools of his county.

These conferences will do you good, and all the rest good. None of us ever know too much about the various duties expected of us as public servants and these meetings are invaluable, not only to post ourselves on matters of vital importance, but we need the stimulating effects of public discussions. We should have more of these conferences than we do so that we can fully measure up to our responsibilities.
