AN ORDINANCE

An Ordinance to provide for the assessment and collection of taxes in the Town of Manning and for the assessment and collection of a per capita dog tax, and for the assessment and collection of a per capita tax in lieu of working the streets of the said Town, for the fiscal year commencing the second Monday in April, 1917, and ending the second Monday in April, 1918.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Maning, in Council assemble and by authority of the same,

Sec. 1. That a tax of ten (10) Mills on every dollar of the assessed value of all real and personal property lying or being within the corporate limits of the Town of Manning including bonds and stocks of banks and corporations, doing business in the said Town evcept such property as is exempt by law from taxation, be and the same is levied for the fiscal year commencing the second Monday in April, 1917, and ending the second Monday in April, 1918.

Sec. 2. That a commutation tax of Two (\$2.00) Dollars per capita on all persons liable to work on the streets of said Town for the fiscal year above mentioned, in lieu of working on said streets be and the same is hereby levied which said commutation tax shall become due and payable when other taxes are payable all able bodieù male persons between the ages of eighteen and fifty years, not otherwise exempt by law are liable to the said tax and all persons who shall be living in the corporate limits of the said Town sixty days prior to the colection of said tax shall become liable to said tax, until the said person or persons can show satisfactory evidence of having performed road duty, or duty upon the streets of same Town or City or produce a receipt for the payment of a commutation tax in lieu thereof, covering the majority part of the fiscal year included in this ordi-

Sec. 3. That a per capits tax of fifty cents be levied on all dogs owned or kept within the limits of the Town of Manning.

Sec. 4. That all taxes levied under the provisions of this ordinance shall become due and payable to the clerk and Treasurer of the Town of Manning between the first day of November, 1917, and the fifteenth day of November, 1917.

Sec. 5. That if the said Taxes are not paid on or before the 15th day of November, o penalty of 25 per cent shall be added until the 1st day of December, 1917, after which last mentioned date the collection of the said taxes and penalties shall be enforced by execution and sale. Ratified by Council this 17th day

of Sept. 1917.
