The first bale of cotton of the 1919 crop was brought on last Thursday and ginned at the Manning Oil Mill ginney. The bale was put on the local market but no buyers were in town and consequently this bale was carried home. The weather has affected the cotton considerably as we had some rain when it first began to open therefore the grades are not as

good as was expected owing to that fact. However within the next few days we expect to see quite a bit of cotton on the local market and some very good grades. The price is very good but not what it should be and as a warning I would like to state that it will not be a good idea for the farmers to flood the market but let the cotton dry out and a much better price will be turned out when it is ginned. Low grades will be a good bit off middling this year and precision should be used in gathering same. Damp cotton will injure the whole bale if mixed in and will cause the whole bale to be classed as low grade. Reports of a still smaller crop are being rumored every where and when the next government report comes out no doubt but what the price will advance a good deal. The greatest danger is in flooding the market and slow selling will help to get a better price.
