ALCOLU NEWS NOTES

Recent seasonable rains has improved the crops condition of this community very much. We have good outlooks for a good corn crop and good peavine crop. The material cut in the acreage of cotton, together with the approximate cut of seventy-five per cent in the use of fertilizer and the certain inroads of destruction of the boll weevil, a very short cotton crop will be made.

Last week there was an agent going among the colored farmers offering them a preparation that meant sure death to the boll weevil. The preparation was a white mixture, put up in pint bottles, one pint to be mixed with five gallons of water which would be sufficient for ten acres of cotton. One application would last for ninety days, or for one cotton making season, price \$1.50 per pin, cash. The Sheriff and his rural policemen should be instructed to look out for such beats.


A VOUCHER TO SHOW ST. PETER
