new rules and regulations adopted July 1st, 1921, and will embrace three groups of questions.

The Primary division embraces the following subjects: English Grammar and Language, Arithmetic, Play-ground and Community Activities, and General History, Geography, Civics and Current Events, Literature, Pedagogy, Health, Nature Study, School Law, Manual Training.

The General Elementary division embraces the following subjects: English Grammar and Composition, Arithmetic, History, U. S. and S. C., Geography, Civics and Current Events, Spelling, Reading, Pedagogy, Physiology and Hygiene, Nature Study and Agriculture, School Law, and Algebra.

The High School Division embraces the following: Grammatical Analysis and Composition, Literature, Principles of Teaching, American History and Civics, Science (General Science, Physiology, Biology, Physics, Chemistry, Agriculture, Home Economics—seven offered, two required) Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry, Foreign Language (Latin, French, Spanish, German—four offered, one required) Ancient and Modern History, School Law.

It behooves each and every teacher to qualify under some division. Teachers holding Permits must take the examination, or they may find themselves debarred from teaching.

Fuller information relative to renewals of certificates and credentials on which to secure certificates may be had by writing for the pamphlet issued by the State Board of Education giving the Laws and regulations adopted July 1st.

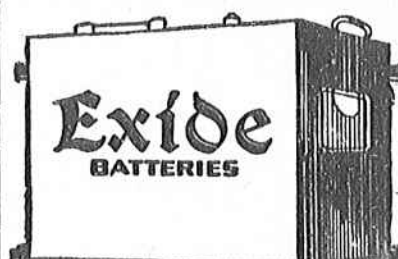
