# NEWS BREVITIES

Condensed from Wide Fields, Domestic and Foreign.

## AS THEY ARE HAPPENING DAILY

Suited to the Wants of Busy Readers Seeking a Knowledge of What is Going on.

H. Clay Pierce was on Tuesday, acquitted of the charge of perjury in swearing that the Walters-Pierce Oil Co., of Texas was not connected with the Standard Oil Company when the Standard Oil company owned a majority of the stock.

John R. Early, who was some time ago diagnosed as not having leprosy, is again confined in Washington and a charge is brought against him of crime in exposing himself with a contagious disease.

According to the last report from Washington the value of the South's agricultural crop this year stands up nearly \$2,400,000,000.

The twelfth juror has at last been secured for the night riders to be tried at Union City, Tenn., for the assassination of Col. Quinton Rankin.

A boiler at the Union Phosphate plant, Tigra, Fla., exploded, demolishing the plant without injuring one of 100 men at work in the plant.

The apprehension which gave rise to the Monroe Doctrine may be said to have nearly disappeared says President Taft.

The 61st Congress opened in regular session Monday. Both bodies were in session less than one hour. The President's message was read Tuesday.

It is said that 80,000 Armenians are on the verge of starvation.

The work on the Cape Cod canal has been suspended until next spring.

The House of Lords by rejecting the budget has caused an alienation of the House of Commons and has caused the King to prorogue parliament besides stirring English politics to fever heat.

Secretary of the Treasury McVeagh estimates the national expenses for 1911 at \$103,370,303 less than the appropriation for 1910.

The Phoenix Insurance Co., of Brooklyn, N. Y., it seems has had a million dollars fleeced from it by its president who has been suspended since his unfaithfulness was discovered.

President Taft in addressing the American Red Cross in Washington Tuesday expressed the hope that some one would yet endow the association with a \$5,000,000 gift.

President Taft was on Tuesday re-elected president of the American Red Cross.

Senator Root presiding over the Senate in the absence of vice President Sherman made a blunder by which the report of Secretary McVeagh was released before it was intended. He attempted to call in the release an hour later but some of the papers had sent it out already.

The Charlotte, N. C., aldermen have determined that the post-stick noise and confusion shall not form a part of the Christmas celebrations this year. This action was taken on account of the abuses of the privileges heretofore.

Four Austrians, near Cumberland, Md., last Saturday, were throwing 50 pounds of dynamite for blasting, when it exploded and all were fearfully injured.

Navigation closed on the Great lakes at 12 o'clock Sunday night. Twenty-five vessels and 62 lives were lost during the last season.

The New Orleans Times-Democrat says letters received confirm the report that Zelaya had the bodies of Groce and Cannon burned and the ashes swept in dust and filth and then into the San Juan river.

Three prisoners in the State of New York contain 24 men condemned to die in the electric chair.

Antonio Mangino at Cleveland, Ohio, on last Saturday, murdered his wife and three children, two of whom were his step children, in the most horrible way, crushing their heads and stabbing them beside.

George Marly, of Norfolk, Ohio, who is 81 years old, got his neck broken some time ago and he has been successfully treated, the physicians believing he will soon be entirely recovered.

It has been satisfactorily ascertained that an inexperienced boy, not properly instructed, left a car with hay upon it near an open trench that caused the great Cherry mine disaster. The boy escaped to tell the tale on the witness stand.

The four-masted schooner, Marie Palmer, stranded near Pan Shoals, N. C., Wednesday, is a total wreck. Very little of the cargo was saved.

J. Pierpont Morgan has secured a majority of the stock and therefore a controlling interest in the Equitable Life Insurance Company.

Half of Charles Warriner's stealings from the Big Four Railroad cannot be accounted for.

A fire on Thursday did \$600,000 damage in the wholesale department in Baltimore. It was the largest fire Baltimore has had since 1904.

A Federal grand jury at Louisville, Ky., on Thursday found bills against the Louisville and Nashville and the Louisville, Henderson and St. Louis railroads and the American Tobacco Company for rebating.

Hampton's Magazine has bought the American and Canadian right to Commander Peary's North Pole story for \$50,000.

## DR. F. A. COOK.

New Attack Upon Him—His Lawyer Withdraws—Defended by His Doctor and Copenhagen divine—In a Maine Sanitarium.

New York, Special.—The New York Times presents the remarkable narratives of two men, made under oath, declaring that they were employed by Dr. Frederick A. Cook, to fabricate astronomical and other observations for submission to the University of Copenhagen, which is about to pass upon Dr. Cook's assertion that he discovered the North Pole on April 21, 1908. These men are George H. Dunkle, an insurance broker, of 31 Nassau street, New York and Capt. August Wedel Loose a sea captain of 437 Thirteenth St., Brooklyn. For their labors they were to have received jointly from Dr. Cook \$4,000 with an additional bonus of \$500 to Capt. Loose upon the acceptance of the records by the University of Copenhagen. They say that Dr. Cook had paid them only \$260 when he disappeared on the eve of the dispatch of his "records" to Copenhagen two weeks ago and his failure to pay the sum remaining due them they freely acknowledge to be their motive for coming forward with the story.

Accompanying these narratives will appear copies of the affidavits of Capt. Loose and Dunkle affirming their accuracy.

Another New York dispatch says Dr. Frederick A. Cook's personal lawyer Henry Wellington Waack, has severed relations with his client. Mr. Waack refused to confirm or deny his withdrawal, but it can be affirmed on competent authority that, after a consultation with his partners, Mr. Waack wrote Dr. Cook so long ago as November 30 that he must beg him to seek legal advice elsewhere.

A Copenhagen cablegram of Thursday says Dr. Trop, rector of the University of Copenhagen, says that the charges published in The New York Times against Dr. Frederick A. Cook are based on pure fiction. Nevertheless, he added, he would accept the offer to examine the documents prepared by Loose and Dunkle, which The Times has agreed to send to Copenhagen.

Walter Lonsdale, secretary to Dr. Cook, who brought the explorer's data to Copenhagen, also declared that the accusations published in New York and London against Dr. Cook were totally unfounded.

Dr. Cook is known to be at Pine Tree Sanitarium at Wells, Maine, under treatment of Dr. T. S. Pitts for a bad nervous condition which Dr. Pitts says, however, is not dangerous to mind or body and he considers him as now recuperating.

Cotton Ginned to December 1st. Washington, Special.—There were 8,878,277 running bales of cotton ginned from the growth of 1909, to December 1, as compared with 11,008,661 for 1908, according to a bulletin of the census bureau issued Thursday.

These figures count round bales as half bales and exclude linters. They stand against 8,343,396 for 1907 and 10,207,868 for 1906. The proportion of the last three crops ginned to December 1 is 84.1 per cent. for 1908, 75.5 per cent. for 1907, and 77.2 per cent. for 1906. Round bales included this year are 133,919 against 201,480 included for 1908 and 154,636 for 1907. Sea Island bales included are 77,776 for 1909; 68,396 for 1908, and 55,299 for 1907.

The distribution of sea island cotton by States for 1909 is: Florida 25,906; Georgia 43,118, and South Carolina 8,752. The total cotton crop for 1908 was 13,086,005, and for 1907 is 11,757,822. The corrected statistics of the quantity of cotton ginned this season to November 14 are 8,112,119 bales.

Alabama 919,575; Arkansas 613,871; Florida 55,958; Georgia 1,677,232; Louisiana 237,553; Mississippi 866,950; North Carolina 536,163; Oklahoma 594,836; South Carolina 498,340; Tennessee 206,357; Texas 2,212,319; all other States 49,133.

Two Battleships Collide. Washington, Special.—The battleships Georgia and Nebraska collided Thursday afternoon while engaged in tactical exercises off the Virginia capes. The effects of the collision were not serious and the two ships were able to return to Hampton Roads Friday with the entire fleet. Rivets in the two vessels were strained. This information came to the Navy Department Friday afternoon.

Shameful White Slave Trade. Washington, Special.—All but incredibly revolting are the disclosures of an international system of traffic in both the enforced and the voluntary degradation of men and women contained in the report on the so-called "white slave trade" submitted to Congress Friday by the United States immigration commission. Shocking as is the tale of voluntary shame told in the report, extremely more so is the setting forth of well-attested facts as to the compulsory consignment of innocent immigrant girls to the life of the bawd.

Many Bills Introduced. Washington, Special.—As an indication of activity in the interest of legislation, Senators Friday introduced more than 350 bills and resolutions covering a great variety of subjects. Many of these measures failed of passage during the last Congress and 80 per cent of them will receive scant consideration this session. Many are for pensions that could not be granted under the law.
