OUTDOOR EVAPORATOR.

A Handy Arrangement For Drying Fruit in Small Quantities.

Portable evaporators are especially convenient when it is desired to dry only a few bushels of fruit at any one time. The usual sizes have a capacity of five to ten bushels a day, and even more in some cases, although the quantity will of course vary with the attention given to them. As they are complete in themselves and are not too heavy to be readily moved they may be placed wherever convenience from time to time dictates.

The figure shows an evaporator of this type which is constructed entirely

of wood, except the parts in direct contact with the heater. There is space for ten trays for holding fruit, the dimensions of which are 2 1/4 by 3 feet. Each tray holds about one-half bushel of fruit. Modifications of such an evaporator to suit individual needs and exigencies readily suggest themselves.

There are several other styles of this type obtainable from manufacturers which are made of sheet iron, usually galvanized. As no wood enters into their construction danger from fire is eliminated. One of these styles is provided with a heat deflector and so directed that hot currents of air pass over the fruit as well as up through it, the claim being made that movement of air induces a more uniform drying of the fruit than in ordinary methods of construction.—H.
