Negro Was 115 Years Old.

"Uncle" Fenton Diggs, venerable colored man who died Monday evening and who was buried Tuesday afternoon was a remarkable character," said Miss Margaret Glenn, assistant postmaster in Yorkville who was talking about the old man the other morning.

"According to Dr. R. A. Bratton, Uncle Fenton was about 115 years of age, having been born along about 1806. He was a slave of the late Lieut. Gov. Robert G. McCaw, of Yorkville and after he was emancipated he worked for my father, the late Sheriff R. H. Glenn, for many years. That's how I came to know him. The old man was always courteous and polite and was in fact a white man's negro. He voted the Democratic ticket all of his life and he rode in the Red Shirt parade in 1876. He never did know his exact age, of course, but I have heard him say that when the stars fell in 1853 he was big enough 'ter go to see de

gals." The old man enjoyed good health all of his life until a short while ago although he lost one eye in an accident several years ago while engaged in repairing a fence. It is said that at the time of his death every tooth in his head was sound. He is survived by his widow who is a very old woman but not so old as he was."

We do not guarantee keeping qualities of potatoes dug after a killing frost or if they are dug when the land is wet. Please get necessary crates from our potato house at once. We advise to grade best you can in the field. We have a bulletin on grading which we would like to supply you. Best care fully lay potatoes in the crates same as you would handle eggs, and do not throw into heaps striking potatoes against each other. Bring to curing house same day as dug, if possible, but not later than the second day if you expect best results. We will buy strictly number one and number two Porto Rica potatoes at one cent per pound f. o. b. our curing house, we to furnish crates. We sell Fulghum oats and Abruzzi rye. Best secure your seed at once and arrange to complete your planting not later than November, the tenth.

We are installing a large power corn sheller to handle shucked ear corn. Pull and shuck your corn. We will shell for you and buy for cash or grind for toll.
