The fact that a local concern will install for next season a flour mill seems to indicate that the people expect to plant wheat on a larger scale in this county next season. We trust that they will. Many people have an idea that home grown wheat does not turn out as good flour as "store bought" flour. This is an erroneous impression. Wheat grown in South Carolina turns out a better grade of flour than a majority of that sold as the best on the market. Five to six barrels of flour may be made to the acre on average land with proper cultivation, and in addition to the flour made, the farmer will have a large quantity of bran and seconds, which makes one of the best feeds to be had.

### THE GERMAN CASUALTY LIST.

Report Brings Total Number to About 57,800.

Berlin, via The Hague and London, November 8.—A German casualty list just issued brings the total of numbers in last week's report up to about 57,800. Hospital records show a very large proportion of the wounded have returned to duty.

The last casualty list records the killing of three German aviators and the wounding of six others by hostile airmen.

### Safelowers Work for Naught.

Atlanta, November 9.—T. J. Ash, of Ash & Estes, furniture dealers, walked into the store at No. 384 Decatur street Monday to find the safe, muffled in mattresses, standing in the middle of the floor, with its door blown off, evidently by nitro-glycerin. The cracksmen had done a workmanlike job, but got only \$6 for their labor.

That his good safe should be destroyed for the sake of such a small amount distressed Mr. Ash. The burglars had dragged the heavy safe from the office into the main part of the store. The nitro-glycerin seemed to have been poured in at the hinges. Shortly before 10 o'clock Sunday night Julius Silverman, of No. 404 Decatur street, reported to the police that he heard a muffled explosion, the source of which he was not able to determine.

When Mr. Ash sought to enter the store by the front way Monday morning, he found the front door wedged tightly shut. The rear door, through which the safe blowers evidently had entered and departed, was open. No clue was left.
