A HANDSOME BUILDING.

J. H. Hampton's Old Stand Will be Torn Down Immediately—Buys Out Wheeler.

He will close out his groceries as quickly as possible and will quit the green grocery business entirely and will engage strictly in confectionery.

On each Wednesday the vote will be counted and the standing of contestants announced in The Weekly Record. A disinterested committee will be elected to count the votes.
