THE HERST PARTY IS NORTHWARD BOUND.

A MEAGRE REPORT

The Party is Scheduled to Leave Pecos at 12:15 in the Morning. This Would Bring the Party to Roswell Early in the Morning.

Pecos, Texas, Oct. 20.—2:30 p. m. Advices just received here are that the special train bearing the Hearst party will leave Pecos for the north at 12:15 in the morning.

TO UNIONIZE LABOR.

Southern Workers Seem to Have Little Union Enthusiasm.

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 20.—The second annual convention of the United Textile Workers of America, that opened in Philadelphia today, will devote a great deal of its time to the discussion of unionizing cotton-mill labor in the south.

The present convention is the first since all branches of textile labor in the United States were amalgamated in the association. It has been only during the past year that the American Federation of Labor gave the association jurisdiction over the silk weavers. A number of independent cotton and woolen workers' unions have also been drawn into the larger organization, and now all are combined under the same jurisdiction. The organization includes unions of blanket weavers, woolen workers, bleaching workers and burlap workers. The convention begun today has before it the huge task of making laws for the government of all these varied interests.

The unionizing of the southern cotton mill workers is the most vexing question expected to come before the convention. The situation is made the more interesting by the popular belief that some of the leaders among the unionized workers of the north feel that they have the warm secret support of northern manufacturers in their efforts to unionize the southern workers, as the accomplishment of this design would lessen the fast growing advantage the southern mills have in their competition against the northerners. The problem, however, is most difficult, and all the more so because the southern workers have little enthusiasm. They show a willingness to organize when approached by an the union so long as the organizer remains among them, but soon drift away when he leaves. The leaders of the movement say, however, that the present convention will tackle the southern problem with a determination to solve it and unionize the whole field.

WABASH TO RESTORE TRAINS.

This Railroad is Adding to and Not Cutting Down Its Service.

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 17.—The Wabash railroad's Pacific coast service between this city and Los Angeles and San Francisco is to be restored tonight when the first train, consisting of superb new parlor and sleeping cars, is to leave Chicago for the far west. In addition to restoring the Pacific coast service the Wabash will beginning tomorrow maintain a through service between Chicago and Galveston, by way of the Iron Mountain and International & Great Northern.

TWO INDIANS WERE HERE.

Janny Esz Heysahyah and Squaw Come to Meet Charlie Three Fingers.

Charlie Three Fingers, a former Mescalero Apache Indian chief arrived here yesterday after a visit to Ft. Sill, Oklahoma, and left yesterday afternoon on the Lincoln stage to wait for his brother-in-law "Where two rivers connect."

Janney Esz Heysahyah, his brother-in-law and squaw arrived here last night to meet him, but he had already left for "where two rivers connect" and they left on a road wagon to meet him and take him home to the Mescalero Agency of the Apache Indians about 100 miles west.

Charlie Three Fingers was an Apache chief and is an old friend of Postmaster Mathews and was very much disappointed that he was out of the city.

The following letter, written in true Indian style, was received by Janny Eszheyzah at the Mescalero Agency from Charlie Three Fingers:

Fort Sill, O. T.
Oct. 11, 1903.

My dear Son in Law

I am going to write a letter. I am going back to Roswell station, and want you to wait for me, a place where, two Rivers connect together and wait for me there until 9 days. I am going to start from here four (4) days from now
