JAP CLARK WAS FOUND GUILTY
LAST NIGHT.

CLEMENCY RECOMMENDED

The Time of the Court To-Day Has
Been Taken Up in Securing Another
Venue.—The Hendricks Murder

Docket.

THE ROSWELL CAR.

Oklahomans Take a Glimpse at the
Exhibit.

Okla. Times-Journal, Nov. 6.
A Santa Fe car containing a num-
ber of the products grown along the
Pecos Valley in the vicinity of Ros-
well, New Mexico, is on the Santa
Fe track just north of Grand avenue.
The exhibits are under the manage-
ment of Ava E. Page, a prominent
real estate man.

The car contains fruits of all kinds
and they are of exceptional large
size, and all who have seen the car
could hardly believe that the prod-
ucts were raised outside of Oklahoma.
The car contains alfalfa of an un-
usual quality, several large sweet
potatoes, watermelons and a large
display of grapes, peaches, pears
and figs and fifty-three kinds of ap-
ples.

The best display of all is the fifty-
six sweet potatoes which weigh each
four pounds or nearly a pound each.
Mr. Page stated that he had sold
Klondike Parker, a former resident
of this city, a lot of property about
three years ago and that it had in-
creased in value three hundred per
cent and Mr. Parker still refused to
sell.

The car will be here all day and
tomorrow, and it is well worth see-
ing. Mr. F. C. O'Neill, the commer-
cial agent of the Santa Fe, is intro-
ducing Mr. Page to the local resi-
dents.
