Notice of Creation of New Precinct and of Election for Justice of the Peace and Constable.

Whereas, A petition signed by more than fifty qualified voters and taxpayers, residents of the Territory hereinafter mentioned, has been presented to the Board of County Commissioners of Chaves county asking the creation of a new precinct as hereinafter described and the election of a justice of the peace and constable to serve as such in said precinct:

Now Therefore Notice is Hereby Given that a new precinct has been created in the county of Chaves by dividing Precinct No. 1 of said county, said new precinct to be known as Precinct No. 7 of the county of Chaves and to be composed of all that part of Precinct No. 1 of said county as the same now exists that lies south of the Second Standard Parallel South (Otherwise known as Second street in the City of Roswell).

Notice is hereby further given that an election is hereby called to be held in the territory herein described and at the machine shop of J. Q. Cummins on Main street in the City of Roswell and in the Fourth ward thereof for the election of one Justice of the Peace and one Constable to serve in the new precinct herein before mentioned until their successors are elected and qualified at the ensuing general election for such officers in the Territory of New Mexico. The said election to be held on Tuesday, June 7th, A. D. 1904. The polls will open at 9 o'clock a. m. and close at six o'clock p. m., and only such qualified voters as reside within the precinct hereby created shall be allowed to vote. The following are hereby appointed judges of said election: J. G. Hedgcock, Fred Roth and W. C. Burrus, and the following are appointed clerks: H. J. Wall and J. J. Jones.

MUNN & CO. SUSPEND.

One of the Oldest Firms in the Cotton Trade.
New York, May 31.—The suspension of S. Munn & Co. was announced on the cotton exchange today. This firm is one of the oldest in the cotton trade in this city. The head book-keeper and cashier disappeared about ten days ago, but the firm believes that as soon as the accounts are straightened out it will be able to resume business.
At the office of the firm it is said that Clarence H. Cameron, office manager and head clerk, had been absent about a week. The examination of his books so far made, it is added show apparent discrepancies amounting to about \$125,000.

COMMITTED SUICIDE.

Mayor MacLane Went Through the Baltimore Fire a Hero, and Now Kills Himself.
Baltimore, Md., May 31.—President H. Clay Timanus of the second branch of the city council took the oath of office as mayor this morning, succeeding Robt. M. MacLane, who committed suicide yesterday by shooting himself in the head. Timanus will serve out the remainder of MacLane's term of three years. Timanus is a Republican.

Kaw River Flood Receding.

Topeka, Kan., May 31.—The Kaw river is slowly falling at this point. The government weather bureau reports the gauge as showing twelve feet above low water mark at ten today. This is five feet lower than the highest measurement Monday. Aside from shutting off the gas and stopping street car traffic, North Topeka suffered little from the flood.

Kansas City, Mo., May 31.—Three trains remained near Quenemo, Kansas for twelve hours yesterday on account of the floods which washed it portion of the Santa Fe and Missouri Pacific tracks. The majority of the passengers were east bound, many of them coming from the Methodist General Conference at Los Angeles, and others from El Paso. All the trains carried diners, and there was no suffering.

Ottawa, Kan., May 31.—The flood conditions in this vicinity are fast improving, the water receding rapidly. Communication with North Ottawa where hundreds of persons were driven from their homes, was opened today with boats and provisions were taken to the unfortunates. Six men marooned in the Santa Fe depot who were without food since Sunday, were brought away today. The country around Ottawa for several miles has been swept clean, the crops being wiped out and many cattle drowned.

Most Powerful Locomotive.

Schenectady, N. Y., June 1.—Engine No. 2,400, built by the Schenectady plant of the American Locomotive Co., for the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, will be taken out next week to St. Louis, where it will be exhibited as the most prominent feature in transportation building at the world's fair.
The locomotive is the most powerful ever built. The design follows that of the Mallet compound used for heavy hauling. There are six pairs of driving wheels. Three pairs are under the forward end of the boiler and the remaining three beneath the fire-box. The driving wheels are quite small, being but 56 inches in diameter. The weight is 360,000 pounds. Preliminary tests conducted here go to show that the locomotive is 1-2 times more powerful than any other locomotive ever constructed.
