The sympathy goes out to the mother and sister of Lewis Etzil, the correspondent who was yesterday killed by Chinese soldiers while he was working in his line of duty.

Precinct No. 7 has a Justice of the Peace of its own, but it is questionable whether police cases can be tried before him. The Justice designated by the Council as Police Judge has according to statutes full and exclusive jurisdiction over police cases.

WOODMAN SPARE THAT TREE.

The shibboleth in Roswell may soon be, "Alderman, Spare that tree." A motion was passed at the city council last night instructing the Engineer to cut all trees that were more than six inches in the way of the new cement sidewalks that are to be built. It is too bad that walks and trees cannot occupy the same space. Good walks and beautiful trees are both devoutly to be wished and it is a pity that one should be in the way of the other. Roswell's chief beauty is her trees, and it is doubtful whether public policy demands any tree to be cut unless it completely blocks the walk. The property owner must of course, understand from the beginning that he must keep his walk in good condition if the trees by their growth injure the walk. But for the sake of preserving many beautiful trees would it not be well to make the six inches more nearly six feet. This is a ques-

tion in which every property owner is vitally interested. But if the six inch resolution is to be given the effect of law, and if this be still the opinion of the Council on further consideration and after further consultation with those property owners most interested then let it be enforced to the letter without exception in the same manner as all other ordinances of the city should be enforced.

Frost in Missouri.
 The stereopticon exhibition given here last night by Frank Frost, of Roswell, N. M., was a decided success. The views used were of the natural scenery of the Pecos Valley, in New Mexico. No more splendid exhibition of the kind was ever given at this place. Mr. Frost was born and reared 1 1/2 miles northwest of town. He moved away from here about 12 years ago. He is a photographer by profession. The views he exhibits are of his own creation.
