Matilda Preusser, wife of Judge J. G. Preusser, died at her home in this city, Tuesday evening, at seven o'clock, of pneumonia. Mrs. Preusser's maiden name was Matilda Kanter. She was born in Dlusburg, Prussia, on June 3, sixty-eight years ago. Her first husband was a Mr. Fischer by whom she had four children who now survive her and are Mrs. Lem Allen and Mrs. John R. Nasworthy of San Angelo, Rudolph Fischer of San Marcial, N. M., and Mrs. Wm. Hughes of Roswell N. M.

After Mr. Fischers death she married Judge Preusser in San Angelo in 1874 and has resided here ever since. The surviving children of the second union are John Preusser of Miles and Mrs. Jack Fletcher of Roswell, N. M. Besides these children, she leaves a number of step-children and other relatives to mourn her demise. She was a good and loving wife and to her credit in the Book of Life are recorded many kind and charitable deeds.

The funeral took place Thursday afternoon at Fairmount cemetery. Services were conducted at the grave and residence by the Baptist minister, Rev. Catlett Smith.
